# MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Prior to the meeting, copies of the minutes taken during the November 4, 1988 and November 8, 1988 meeting were distributed for review.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Smith and seconded by Dr. Dockery to accept the minutes as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT Roger L. Mell, M.D.

Dr. Mell reported that arrangements are progressing well for the 83rd Annual Meeting to be held November 5-8 in Washington, D.C. Dr. Mell expressed his appreciation to Dr. Bill Cooper, Chairman of Local Arrangements, Mrs. Ellen Proxmeier, and Dr. Dockery for his input on the President's

Symposium.

Dr. Mell highlighted the following events and entertainment: The Opening Ceremony speaker will be Mr. John McLaughlin, host of The McLaughlin Group; the President's Reception will feature a John Philip Sousa concert; the Doctors' Day Luncheon will feature political correspondent and humorist, Mark Shields; the President's Symposium is entitled "The Impact of Biotechnology on Medicine" and The President's Dinner Dance theme will be SMA's Salute to Music In America, featuring Fabian and Danny Gans.

### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN John F. Redman, M.D.

Dr. Redman reported on his activities during his four months as Chairman of the Council, stating his actions have been in keeping with the goals he announced at the New Orleans Executive Committee Meeting. Dr. Redman stated he searched the ranks

of the membership to place the right people in the right jobs and he attended the following meetings: the Associate Councilors' Orientation, the Coordinating Committee on Insurance, the Coordinating Committee on Education and the Long Range Planning Committee.

Dr. Redman stated further, the majority of his efforts have been to streamline the setting of management by objectives process so that goals and objectives are clearly interpretable by the Council in keeping with the Long Range Planning document. Dr. Redman reported the more he worked to develop the format, the more strongly he sensed the importance in trying to mesh the efforts of both the Council and the administration to increase SMA's effectiveness and communication.

### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT Mr. William J. Ranieri

Mr. Ranieri reported the health of SMA's affiliated organizations is very strong. Specifically, the Southern Orthopaedic Association (SOA) is the largest regional specialty society in the country with 2,631 total members; the Southern Association for Oncology (SAO) is a financially successful venture, with nearly 400 total members (244 charter members); and the Southern Medical Educational Resources Consortium (SMERC) is composed of

Mr. Ranieri also presented a slide overview and narrative pointing out key indicators of departmental progress to enable the Executive Committee to evaluate the progress of the Association.

31 institutional members.

Mr. Ranieri explained that the budget for January, 1989 had been previously mailed and the February, 1989, budget had been distributed at the meeting. He asked Mr. Taylor to present the SMA Consolidated Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balance as of February 28, 1989.

Dr. Dockery commended Mr. Taylor for the excellent manner in which the budget was presented.

### REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

Louis A. Cancellaro, M.D.

Dr. Cancellaro reported the Coordinating Committee on Education met on February 24, 1989 in Atlanta, Georgia. He stated that the planning for the 1989 Scientific Assembly is on schedule and the scope of educational activities will exceed last year's meeting.

The Committee also approved a mission statement for Continuing Medical Education to be submitted as part of the application for the upcoming accreditation meeting with the American Council for Continuing Medical Education on June 2, 1989 in

Chicago, Illinois.

Dr. Cancellaro announced the formation of SMA's 24th Specialty Section "Rheumatology, Physical Medicine and Rehabilita-tion". This new Section will host a section meeting, social and postgraduate course at the Annual Meeting.

Dr. Cancellaro presented the following Recommendation from the Coordinating Committee on

Education:

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Cancellaro and seconded by Dr. Dockery that the Editorial Board of the Southern Medical Journal be increased to include Richard Lee Mabry, M.D. The motion carried

ACTION: - It was moved and seconded that the report of the Coordinating Committee be approved as submitted. The motion carried unanimously.

# REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Thomas C. Rowland, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Rowland reported the recommendations of the Coordinating Committee on Insurance held in

Atlanta, Georgia on June 28, 1989:
RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:—To adopt a six area geographical rating plan to begin with the April

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Dockery to raise the major medical insurance plan range from 0 to 12% in a six area distribution in lieu of the previous 17% overall increase. The motion carried with one opposition.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3:- To have SMA Services, Inc. licensed as an insurance agency.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Dockery that SMA Services, Inc. be licensed as an insurance agency. The motion carried unanimously.

Dr. Redman commended Dr. Lansing and Dr. Rowland for their work on the Coordinating Commit-

tee on Insurance.

### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON LONG RANGE PLANNING Louis A. Cancellaro, M.D.

Dr. Cancellaro reported on the Long Range Planning meeting held in Atlanta, Georgia on February 25, 1989 and presented the following recommenda-

tions from that meeting:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1:—That the topic of membership expansion into other states be deferred until the next Long Range Planning meeting and that SMA develop methods to vigorously and aggressively recruit members in present states.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Cancellaro and seconded by Dr. Mell that the topic of membership expansion into other states be defered until the next Long Range Planning meeting and that SMA develop methods to aggressively recruit members

in present states. The motion carried unanimously.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2:—That the wording 
"complimentary membership" be submitted to the Bylaws Committee for review and definition.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Cancellaro and seconded by Dr. Dockery that the wording "com-plimentary membership" be submitted to the Bylaws Committee for review and definition. The motion carried unanimously.

Dr. Cancellaro also reported that the Long Range Planning Committee reviewed the management by objective form. Dr. Redman offered to come to Birmingham to review one goal and objective from each department to fine-tune the material to facilitate the completion of this document. The forms will be presented at the Long Range Planning Committee meeting in June in anticipation of the Summer Meeting.

# OLD BUSINESS

Dr. Redman stated that in 1984 the J. X. Revnolds Corporation reviewed performance appraisal methods for SMA and recommended that the Long Range Planning retreat be convened and that a new mission statement and goals be adopted, and that ultimately, objectives be created under those goals. Dr. Redman stated further, that a retreat was held and the Long Range Plan had been through varying generations and evolutions.

Dr. Redman distributed copies of a format he had reviewed with one Departmental Director and explained that this format was designed to utlimately keep the Council informed and active in administrative matters. He stated further, this document could be a dynamic process whereby the Division Directors work with the Coordinating Committee Chairmen to suggest and prioritize goals.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Redman, amended by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Stephenson that Dr. Redman work with the Vice-Chairman of the Council, Dr. Rowland, Mr. Ranieri. and the Division Directors to review the goals with the respective groups to set 1989-90 objectives for presentation to the Executive Committee and Council at the summer meeting. The motion carried unanimously

Mr. Ranieri distributed data which summarized SMA's public relations activities and asked the Executive Committee to review and send comments. on any additions they felt should be made.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

Dr. Redman distributed copies of an evaluation form that included an additional format designed to record the achievement of objectives in the evaluation of Division Directors.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Smith to change the back side of the present SMA Employee Performance Review form to incorporate a management by objectives appraisal. The motion carried.

It was the recommendation of SMA's Legal Counsel to: 1) reincorporate under the Alabama Nonprofit Corporation Act and 2) bring SMA's Articles of Incorporation in line with its Constitution and just have one document. He also stated that the Bylaws would remain a separate document.

Dr. Redman stated this matter was brought to his attention several months ago, and if the Executive Committee had no objections and it was in keeping with the thoughts of the group, he would turn the matter over to the Constitution and Bylaws Committee.

Dr. Redman recommended the following changes in the SMA Bylaws, Chapter 2 - Duties of Officers, Section 5. Council to define the duties of the Council, the Chairman of the Council and Vice-Chairman of the Council.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Redman and seconded by Dr. Dockery to ask the Constitution and Bylaws Committee to define the duties of Councilors, Chairman of the Council and Vice-Chairman of the Council. The motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Lenoir presented a Class V membership application from Ronald A. Alexander, Ph.D., of San-

ta Monica, California.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Mell and seconded by Dr. Dockery to disapprove the membership application of Ronald A. Alexander.

Ph.D. The motion carried unanimously.
Dr. Rowland presented a request from the Auxiliary to authorize an expenditure of up to \$1,000 to

produce a historical monument to the origins of Doctors' Day in Winder, Georgia.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Rowland, seconded by Dr. Barnett and amended by Dr. Dockery to expend \$800.00 to sponsor a historical monument in Winder, Georgia, and a traveling exhibit as well, to commemorate Doctors' Day. The motion carried unanimously.

# REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

John F. Redman, M.D.

Dr. Redman reported that his primary order of business was to work with administration in the development of objectives for long range goals. He stated this was important as a dynamic process to tie in the long range goals, as set by the Council, to the tasks of the administration and also to include the Coordinating Committees of the Council in the development.

Dr. Redman stated he attended several Coordinating Committee meetings and was impressed with the skills of the Chairmen and the actions and recommendations they have given the Association.

### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT Mr. William J. Ranieri

Mr. Ranieri reported that he worked personally with each Director in the development of the objectives. He stated his role was not to change any goals, but rather to work within the goals and state the objectives in a quantifiable fashion. The completed draft of goals and objectives was mailed to Drs. Redman and Rowland for review. After receiving input from Drs. Redman and Rowland, the recommendations were presented to the Long Range Planning Committee, their changes and additions incorporated, and the resulting document was included in the Summer Meeting packet. The Long Range Planning Committee recommended a status report be mailed each quarter to briefly update the Council and Executive Committee on the status of each of the objectives for the current fiscal

Also, Objectives 2 through 6 will be renumbered 3 through 7. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Stephenson and seconded that Objective 2 under Goal II, Administration be changed to: Conduct 3 mailings of interest to students, residents, interns and medical school deans regarding specific programs of interest to residents and interns. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded to add Objective 3 under Goal II, Administration: To increase scholarships, grants and loans to medical students. The motion carried unanimously

Dr. Rowland commended the staff for their efforts regarding the goals and objectives for the fiscal year in relation to the Long Range Planning goals.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Hill that Objective 2, under Goal III, Administration be changed: To develop strategies and recommendations based on the outcome of the studies defining our relationship to affiliated societies for SMA with the suggested target date of June 30, 1991. Consecutively, Objective 1 should become Objective 3 and current Objective 2 to become Objective 1. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Barnett that Objective 3, under Goal I, Education be changed: To continue to publish the Southern Medical Journal at the least expense to preserve the quality for the benefit of the membership. Dr. Dockery withdrew the motion.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Dockery to remove Objective 3, under Goal I, Education. The motion died for lack of a second.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Crabtree that Objective 3, under

Goal I, Education, be changed: To limit the annual increase in total expenses for the Southern Medical Journal to the least possible. The motion carried

unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 4, under Goal 1, Education be changed: To obtain a minimum of \$5,000 in sponsorship for the publication of the 83rd Annual Scientific Assembly program of activities and insert in Goal I, Objective 5 before \$10,000 the words "a minimum of". The motion carried unanimously.

minimum of". The motion carried unanimously. ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 1, under Goal V, Education be changed: To procure sponsorship and conduct a series of lectures and rounds on HIV to be offered in 20 select hospitals achieving an average attendance of 20. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 2, under Goal V, Education be changed: To cosponsor at least one educational program with proprietary hospitals achieving attendance of 40. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION: —It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 1, under Goal V, Association Services be changed: To maintain a file for each state to collect data regarding total physician membership by age, sex, and specialty. The motion

carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 3, under Goal II, Association Services be changed: To develop a strategic plan to recruit physician members from corporate practice. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective I, under Goal III, Association Services be changed: To retain at least 5% of the physicians participating in the complimentary programs as full dues-paying members. The motion

carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 1, under Goal V, Association Services be changed: To achieve physician attendance of at least 3,000 at the 83rd Annual Scientific Assembly in Washington, D.C. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded that Objective 3, under Goal IV, Internal Operations be changed: To evaluate changes in the

investment policy annually. The motion carried unanimously.

### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT Roger L. Mell, M.D.

Dr. Mell reported on the schedule of events and programs planned for the 83rd Annual Scientific Assembly of the Southern Medical Association to be held on November 5-8, 1989 in Washington, D.C. He highlighted plans for the Councilor's Party, the President's Private Party and Dinner Dance, the Opening Ceremony, the Doctors' Day Awards Luncheon and the Wine and Cheese party.

Dr. Mell also stated that most importantly, the scientific aspects will be an outstanding educational program which will consist of nine special symposia, plus a symposium on retirement planning and also the first accredited nurses' program; twelve post-graduate courses; three special conjoint meetings; 23 specialty section programs and the President's Symposium.

### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

# REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON PHYSICIANS' RETIREMENT

Howard Kurzner, M.D., Chairman

Dr. Kurzner reported that the Coordinating Committee on Physicians' Retirement met in June, 1989, and discussed the transfer of management of

the marketing from International Benefits Services to SMA Services, Inc. He stated the Committee recommended that the following steps be utilized: 1) Hire a consulting firm to perform an in-depth réview of the program; 2) Develop a comprehensive marketing plan beginning August, 1989; 3) Purchase a computer software package; and, 4) Recruit an excellent coordinator and customer service level employees.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Kurzner and seconded to transfer the management of the marketing from International Benefits Services to SMA Services, Inc. and to continue with Connecticut General as the asset managers. The motion

carried unanimously.

# REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON SHARED SERVICES

Dr. Baldwin reported that the Physicians' Purchasing Program recorded its most profitable year to-date and that profits sponsored several Southern Medical programs during the year.

Dr. Baldwin stated that much time was devoted during the past year to program expansion and new marketing efforts and that these efforts resulted in 9,510 members who had paid the annual \$15 participation fee.

Dr. Baldwin stated further that eight new services have been added and a consumer item catalog was

produced and mailed in June.

In conclusion, Dr. Baldwin thanked Mr. Ranieri, Mr. Sturm, and the Physicians' Purchasing Program staff for their efforts.

# **OLD BUSINESS**

Mr. Ranieri reported on the potential cost benefits for Southern Medical to sell its half of the headquarters building to SMA Services for a tax savings to SMA Services and additional opportunities for revenue to Southern Medical Association from interest earnings received from the mortgage.

# REPORT OF THE **EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT**

Mr. William J. Ranieri

The 1988-89 fiscal year continued to show progress for SMA in terms of growth and development. Membership growth, coupled with increased participation in our programs and services made it a successful year. This report will highlight some of our significant accomplishments for the period July 1, 1988 through June 30, 1989.

### ADMINISTRATION

Our administrative staff expanded to nearly 80 employees with the addition of 15 employees in our insurance administrative unit. The addition of these employees successfully completed the transition of the total administrative and marketing functions of the insurance program to an in-house operation at SMA. Our staff is now responsible for marketing, billing, underwriting, customer service, and all other aspects of administration of the insurance program.

Membership growth in our affiliated societies continued at a strong pace. The Southern Association for Oncology, introduced in this past fiscal year, achieved a membership of nearly 500 physicians. Its first free-standing annual meeting was held this past summer and was an outstanding success.

# ANNUAL SCIENTIFIC ASSEMBLY

The New Orleans Annual Meeting broke all registration attendance records for both physician and spouse registration. Over 4,000 physicians attended what turned out to be one of the best annual meetings ever held. Record sales were achieved with social functions, Auxiliary functions, and postgraduate courses.

### CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION

Our CME activities continued to show substantial gains in attendance in all program areas. Participants in all of our educational activities exceeded 50,000 physicians. The breakdown of participants in our educational offerings was as follows:

The Association received over \$760,000 in grant support for all of the educational activities that were sponsored during this past fiscal year.

### **ASSOCIATION SERVICES**

Total dues-paying members in the Association at the end of our fiscal year numbered 23,740 members. This represents a new high in duespaying members. Associate members in the Association numbered 16.576, and total membership in all categories exceeded 60,000 members for the past fiscal year.

# Typography & Design

This department completed its fifth full year of operation and produced record breaking revenues in excess of \$21,000 per month, resulting in a profit of approximately \$25,000 for the year.

### **Travel Services**

Participation in the SMA Travel Agency continued to grow, and sales in excess of \$56,000 a month were achieved exceeding all projections. We are quite pleased with the results of this operation and look forward to strong continued increases in the coming years.

### Auxiliary

The Auxiliary completed a very active year and saw tremendous increases in its membership. Total membership in the Auxiliary was at 45,540 members at the end of our fiscal year. Doctors' Day programs continued to increase, both in activity and participation. Doctors' Day and Medical Heritage. (Research and Romance) continued to be significant programs, making a very positive contribution to the overall programming of the Southern Medical Association.

### FRINGE BENEFIT PROGRAMS Insurance Program

As stated earlier in this report, the complete administrative transition of the Insurance program took place in January and was completed without any significant problems. Rates began to stabilize during the year with the introduction of a regional rating program which more equitably allocated premium charges to cost centers within our region. Our marketing efforts and sales and promotional activities were expanded and enhanced resulting in significant growth within the program. The total number of insureds in our insurance program now exceeds 15.000 individuals.

# Retirement Program

During this past year the decision was made to transfer the administration of the Retirement Program to an in-house operation. A consultant was employed to assist the staff in a comprehensive review and analysis of the coverage plan design with an effort to improve administrative efficiency, reduce costs, and dramatically increase the number of participants in the retirement program.

### PHYSICIANS' PURCHASING PROGRAM

The Physicians' Purchasing Program continued to grow in revenue and number of participants. Nearly 10,000 physicians have opted to participate in the purchasing program. Several new services were offered through the program which resulted in dramatic increases in revenue and profits.

A number of new and exciting service components are being planned in the purchasing program which should continue to support strong growth and participation.

### INTERNAL OPERATIONS

Despite the tremendous growth this past year in programs and services offered, the addition of a substantial number of new employees, and the need for overall remodeling and repair of the Headquarters Office, the Association showed a strong surplus for the past fiscal year. We continued to add to our reserves which now exceed \$3 million, and the fiscal operation continues to be very strong.

We completed the sixth consecutive year of operation without a dues increase, and our projections indicate we will be able to continue without a dues increase for at least one more year. This is certainly an amazing accomplishment and one in

which we are all proud.

### SUMMARY

We have ended the fiscal year on a very strong and positive note. Membership, revenues, program participation, and Association reserves continue to increase. We have now completed nine strong years of growth and accomplishment and look forward to even stronger, positive activity in the com-

# REPORT OF THE EDITOR SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL

John B. Thomison, M.D.

This report covers the editorial year September 1, 1988, through August 31, 1989. This year for the first time, we have a Deputy Editor, Alan Blum, M.D. He has replaced the two Assistant Editors, Addison B. Scoville, Jr., M.D., and Sam E. Stephenson, Jr., M.D., who served the Journal so long and faithfully in that position, and who continue on the Editorial Board. Rudolph H. Kampmeier, M.D., continues to serve as Editor Emeritus. The Editorial Board consists of Terry D. Allen, M.D., Dallas, Texas; Randolph Batson, M.D., Troy, Alabama; Gerald S. Berenson, M.D., New Orleans, Louisiana; Ben V. Branscomb, M.D., Birmingham, Alabama; Spencer S. Brewer, Jr., M.D., Atlanta, Georgia; Louis A. S. Brewer, Jr., M.D., Atlanta, Georgia; Louis A. During the editorial year, 805 manuscripts, which includes 67 letters to the editor, were received, compared with 746 manuscripts for the 1987-88 editorial year. Five hundred and one papers were published, including 70 letters to the editor, compared with 474 papers published in 1987-88. The overall rejection rate for 1988 was 43%, with a 35% rejection rate for primary articles, and a 59% rejection rate for case reports. This compares with an overall rejection rate in 1987-88 of 48%, with a 42% rejection rate for primary articles and a 56% rejection rate for case reports. For the second straight year we have had an increase in the number of manuscripts received, following two years of declining numbers; 685 manuscripts were received in 1986-87. The backlog of unpublished manuscripts is now below 150, which is a comfortable and appropriate level.

Of all the papers presented at the Annual Meeting, only 56 were submitted for publication. Thirty were accepted for publication, 24 were re-

jected, and 2 are still pending.

For reasons that are not clear to me, the computerization of the Journal is still not completed. A start has been made on manuscript tracking, but this has not been completed, and no program yet exists for reviewer identification.

Though the core staff of the Journal is experienced, dedicated, and hard working, shortages in personnel have severely hampered Journal production, and for a long time we have not had enough pages set in type to more than just meet the demands of the current issue of the Journal. It would be most desirable to have a backlog of papers ready to publish to accommodate at least one additional issue, since any breakdown could result in failure to publish. In addition, this gives the Editor some latitude in putting the book together, which is also desirable. There apparently was some question as to whether or not we would be able to publish the full complement of pages in the November 1989 issue. the make up for which was set in early September. The administration is aware of the problem, and I believe is making every effort to mitigate it, but it is an extremely uncomfortable situation to be in.

Over 50,000 physicians participated in one or more of the educational opportunities offered by the

Association during 1988-89.
The 82nd Annual Scientific Assembly attendance of 4,093 was the highest in the history of the Association. More than 470 papers were presented in specialty section sessions with attendance exceeding 1,000 physicians. An additional 500 physicians participated in joint section meetings. Eleven postgraduate courses attracted over 500 participants. A record 18 sponsored programs achieved a total attendance of nearly 2,000 physicians. More than \$75,000 in grant support was raised for educational sessions. During the four-day meeting, over 500 speakers participated. Not only was the 1988 Annual Meeting the best attended, the scientific program was broader in scope and more diverse than past meetings.

Several additional firsts were achieved this year. Seventeen specialty sections afforded residents an opportunity to compete in paper competition. A total of 171 residents presented papers. Of these presenting, 36 were awarded cash prizes. Although scientific posters have been presented as a part of specialty sections' sessions, for the first time, posters were organized and displayed on the exhibit floor. In addition to 41 scientific exhibits, 17

scientific posters were selected.

Participation in seminars and regional postgraduate conferences of nearly 300 physicians exceeded projected annual goals. Over \$134,200 in educational grants was raised in support of these programs. The successful series of workshops for residents began in 1987 was continued with annual attendance of 124 exceeding goals set for the year. Over 4,000 physicians participated in special programs offered by the Association generating \$127,000 in grant income. More than 11,000 physicians pursued independent-study opportunities through Multi-Media programs.

The educational programs of the affiliated societies were well attended and financed. The Southern Orthopaedic Association (SOA) con-

ducted two annual meetings during the year attaining a total attendance of 348 orthopaedic surgeons. The first annual meeting of the Southern Association for Oncology (SAO) was held in New Orleans in conjunction with SMA's 82nd Annual Scientific Assembly. The organization structure of the SAO was approved, officers and trustees elected and the first scientific program was conducted. Likewise, the first annual meeting of the Southern Medical Education Resources Consortium was held in New Orleans. The Consortium's first annual education program was conducted with 42 institutional representatives in attendance. Over \$140,000 in grant support was received in support of the af-filiated societies. A study was initiated to determine the level of interest in establishing a Southern Society of Geriatric Physicians. Eighty percent of the respondents favor the creation of such an organization. A top priority for next year will be establishing an organization and developing educational activities in geriatric medicine.

Educational grants received during the year in support of educational programs totaled \$760,000 with 65 percent of that sum contributed from

sources outside the Association.

Another major accomplishment of the year was the completion of the Association's reaccreditation self-study. The Coordinating Committee and Education Department staff prepared the study which was submitted for review and approval by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME). Following an on-site meeting with ACCME's Review Committee, the Association was awarded full accreditation for four years (the standard accreditation period).

One of the major thrusts for next year will be in new program development. Several needs assessment studies producing favorable results have been undertaken. Initial planning for the educational programs to be offered during 1989-90 has been finalized. Successful programs from previous years will be updated and offered again. New programs in response to needs assessment data are currently being developed and will be added to the schedule.

The Subcommittee on Scientific Exhibits and Awards approved 44 applications for exhibits and 40 for poster presentations. Two hundred and twenty technical exhibit booths sponsored by 112 companies will be on display as well. Certificates of participation will be given to all exhibitors and poster

The Southern Obstetrical and Gynecological Society will be meeting conjointly with the SMA again this year. We are pleased to have the Dermatology: Clinical and Dermatopathological Seminar, the Ninteenth Annual George Papanicolaou Memorial Seminar, and the 6th Annual Orthopaedic Residents and Fellows' Conference

Abstracts for the Washington meeting were published in the September issue of the Journal. We believe that the publication of the abstracts previewing the papers to be presented will increase meeting registration and also stimulate section meeting attendance. Moreover, publication of scientific exhibit and poster abstracts should promote visiting of these displays. Additionally, a program consisting of abstracts of scientific papers, posters, and exhibits was printed and will be distributed at the annual meeting in the registration area, as well as the business office and throughout the classroom areas. More than \$20,000 was received for sponsorship of the Program of Abstracts and the Program of Scientific Activities.

All SMA members were mailed a copy of their specialty section scientific program in August and September. When combined with targeted nonmember mailings, a total of 60,000 specialty section programs were distributed.

In developmental areas for the Department of Education, the Annual Meeting received first priority. We have retained many of our previous sponsors and have added several new ones. At the Section Secretaries' Conference this past December, joint section meetings, postgraduate courses, and special symposia which were proposed have been

incorporated in this year's program.

An area receiving discussion and attention during the year was the need to strengthen SMA's specialty sections, including membership, annual meeting participation, enhanced educational op-portunities, and leadership roles and respon-sibilities. This is being accomplished by organizing special education subcommittees in each specialty section.

# RESIDENCY TRAINING LOAN PROGRAM

# RESEARCH PROJECT GRANT PROGRAM

The Committee reviewed fifty-eight (58) applications for Research Project Grants from thirty-three (33) medical schools. Funding available for Grants is \$60,000 which is budgeted, plus \$1,600 which was the unused portion of the Loans program which was carried over to the Grants program. The Committee of the August Manual Program of the Committee of t mittee voted to award twenty-eight (28) of the fiftyeight (58) applications for a total of \$61,545. (See Exhibit "B") The Research Grant application has been

revised adding a request for an "Animal Research

Statement" when applicable.

### MEDICAL SCHOOL STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP **PROGRAM**

Of the forty-nine (49) Medical Schools solicited for scholarships in Southern Medical Association's territory, forty-seven (47) have actually responded with applications being submitted by the Deans on the students' behalf. A total of \$47,000 was awarded for

the 1988-89 school year. (See Exhibit "C")
For the 1989-1990 school year, the Council has approved an increase from two (2) \$500 scholarships per medical school to three (3) \$500 scholarships per ships per medical school within the SMA territory.

In the absence of pressing concerns the Standing Committee on Publications and Advertising did not

meet in the 1988-89 year. In fiscal year 1988-89, the Southern Medical Journal contained a total of 384.5 pages of paid advertising, accomplishing the year's goal of averaging 32 pages per month. Advertising pages for pharmaceuticals totaled 344 and non-pharmaceuticals 40.5. Although pharmaceutical ads were down 22 pages from last year, non-pharmaceutical advertising increased by 13.5 pages. Nationally, medical journals have experienced reductions in revenue from pharmaceutical companies. A loss of revenue in advertising income was predicted. As advertising budgets will continue to shrink in the upcoming year, fiscal year 1989-90 advertising levels will be difficult to maintain at best. Circulation figures increased to 30,900—up 100 from last year.

In order to enhance Southern Medical Journal's revenue, several steps were taken including a 9% advertising rate increase effected January 1989. For the first time, an educational grant from Key Pharmaceuticals sponsored the production cost of the 82nd Annual Scientific Assembly Program Supplement which contained abstracts of the scientific papers, exhibits and poster sessions and was distributed at the annual meeting. Regular classified advertisements generated \$6,241.00 in income and the introduction of classified display advertising brought in an additional \$5,760.00 in revenue. End of year production figures total \$829,430 in expenses and \$842,926 in total revenue netting a revenue surplus of \$13,396. Due to a cumulative increase of 23% in paper costs, this revenue surplus was a significant accomplishment. In light of other cost-control measures implemented during the year, an anticipated budget deficit was prevented. Actual budget projections for 1988-89 included a net annual deficit of \$880.

Due to escalating production costs, other costcontainment measures had to be implemented. The Krueger (now Ringier-America) printing location was moved from Senatobia, Mississippi to the Pontiac, Illinois plant. By reducing the weight of SMJ's body (text) paper, savings were seen with little appreciable reduction in quality. These changes proved successful as production costs were reduced approximately \$3,500 per month. Implementation of recommendations of a 2nd Class Postal Regulation Study completed last year resulted in annual postage savings of approximately \$10,000 (\$840.00 per month). In an effort to determine if production costs were competitive, bids were received from other companies in the industry and compared monthly to Krueger prices. Costs were monitored closely throughout the year and will continue to be in the upcoming year.

SMA departments, including Fringe Benefits, Membership and SMA Travel, continue to advertise in the SMJ. In-house filler ads for Video and Dial Access, Clinical Concepts, SMA Travel, Physicians Purchasing Program and Fringe Benefits, were utilized when space was available to publicize SMA services at little cost to the departments or the

Several promotional techniques were utilized including new media kits mailed to approximately 1,800 potential advertisers. A classified advertising campaign resulted in new brochures being designed and mailed with dues notices to 2,500 companies/individuals. Promotional ads were also placed in Southern Medicine for classified advertising.

Effective January 1, 1989, Dr. Alan Blum assumed the responsibilities of the Deputy Editor for the SMJ. He is learning his new duties which are apparently considerably different from his earlier experience with other medical journals. The Editor is working with him to assist in this transition

The Editor and SMA staff are complimented on their accomplishments for the year. Their attention to their duties makes light work for the Standing Committee on Publications and Advertising. The Executive Committee and Council are invited to suggest meaningful work that this Committee might undertake.

Multi-Media Programs experienced a successful year in program development and growth of existing programs. The following report summarizes the major accomplishments in each of the program areas.

#### 1. Dial Access

Subscribers to the program approached 16,000 during the year, with 9,077 calls recorded in that period. A new section, Allergy and Immunology, went on-line. Three sections, OB/GYN, Arthritis and Rheumatology, and Infectious Diseases, were reviewed, and plans were developed for two new sections, Geriatrics and Emergency Medicine, to be added in 1989-90.

Roche Pharmaceuticals and A. H. Robins Company, Inc. continued their support of Infectious Diseases and Cardiovascular Diseases sections respectively, for revenues of \$95,000; SMA Services provided \$155,000 in sponsorship, for a com-

bined total of \$250,000 in support for the year. An Editors' Conference, held April 1-2, 1989, in New Orleans, was well attended and received, and plans were approved for a subsequent meeting in

A cross-referenced subject-title Index for the Dial Access Ready Reference Catalog, a feature suggested at the Editors' Conference, was implemented. Another suggestion, the inclusion of sentenced abstracts in catalog tape listings, was incorporated into the recent Cardiovascular Disease revision, and will be a standard feature in all revisions and new sections hereafter.

**Clinical Concepts** 

Four new programs, in Arthritis and Rheumatism, Antimicrobial Agents, Viral Infections, and Lower Respiratory Tract Infections, were added to the library of Category I monographs available for home study. Early success of the series proved a reliable indicator. Sales totaled 1,162 during the year, an

increase of 92% over the previous year's sales. A total of 102 CME certificates were awarded, indicating an encouraging response for minimal marketing effort. Plans for increased marketing and development of the series in the forthcoming year should yield good results.

**Audio Access** 

Sales in Audio Access increased over 100% from the previous year. Total sales for the year were 886 and included selections from three new programs. Infectious Diseases, Gastroenterology, and Arthritis and Rheumatology, and for the first time, sales of recorded sessions from SMA's Annual Scientific Assembly totaled 269. Because of the success in selling select tapes of Annual Meeting sessions, this practice will continue.

4. Video Access

Five new programs were introduced and video sales totaled 669 over the year, including tapes sold in cooperation with Medicom International. A subscription service with Medicom was initiated on a trial basis, but was discontinued because of that organization's financial difficulties.

During the 1988-89 fiscal year, Multi-Media services were marketed in the Southern Medical Journal. Southern Medicine, and through direct mail flyers in combined mailings. An audiotape on Heart Sounds was featured as an insert in the Southern Medical Journal polybag and received excellent response. A national marketing plan for Dial and Video Access is planned for the forthcoming year, with consideration to Institutional and Society Dial Access membership. Possibilities for interactive video will be explored and Dial Access equipment replaced or significantly revamped, to improve quality of service. The new Dial Access sections, Geriatrics and Emergency Medicine, scheduled to be on-line in 1989, will be marketed nationally, beginning with the 1989 Annual Scientific Assembly. Member interest expressed in these sections has been widespread across all disciplines and their introductions into the system should encourage an increase in Dial Access utilization.

For fiscal year ending June 30, 1989, SMA realized a net increase of 208 dues-paying members which was an increase of 1% over the previous year. Improvements in the administration of SMA's insurance plan and a concentration on membership retention programs should improve this performance in the current year

A highlight of the 1988-1989 fiscal year was the

establishment of the Southern Association for Oncology, the new affiliate of SMA, SAO membership as of June, 1989 was 338 Founding Members and 136 Regular Members for a total of 474 dues-paying

Although the Southern Orthopaedic Association experienced a gross increase of 338 new members, a net decrease of 13 resulted due to non-renewing members. The SOA had 1,895 dues-paying physi-

cians as of June 30, 1989.

SMA realized another excellent year in the recruitment of students and residents. Associate membership reached an all-time high of 16,576 students and residents for an increase of 29.2%

over the previous year.

The Complimentary Program continues to be an excellent recruiting strategy for the Association. Nine hundred and thirty (930) physicians joined SMA through the Complimentary Program from a total of 12,806 eligible physicians. This represents a "conversion" rate of 7,3%. Complimentary states for the 1988-1989 fiscal year were Missouri, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Louisiana. The 1989-1990 complimentary states are Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia with over 16,000 physicians eligible. The entire complimentary program has been evaluated, and new strategies will be employed to focus on those physicians who are truly interested in this program.

In addition to sending out over 1,000 "roster" letters each week to prospective members last year, SMA implemented several programs that enhanced the membership recruitment effort.

The first Orientation and Training Program for Associate Councilors was held in Birmingham in January, 1989. Their responsibilities for membership recruitment were emphasized, and they were given specific goals for recruitment of new members. The meeting also officially kicked-off the SMAC Attack program which provided incentive awards for three levels of achievement. As of August, 1989, over 9,000 personalized letters were mailed for SMAC Attack participants. Thirty-seven (37) dues-paying members and 812 students and residents have joined the SMA due to the activities of the Associate Councilors.

The successful "Secret's Out" membership recruitment program which features journal ads and a testimonial brochure brought in over a hundred new members last fiscal year. This program will continue in the current fiscal year in the states of Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Missouri and

Kentucky.

Recruitment of physicians at state and specialty meetings continues to be an important membership promotional effort. This one-on-one contact pays dividends to the association in new members and exposure it would not receive otherwise.

During the past fiscal year, deans of the medical schools in SMA's territory were made Honorary Members of the SMA. This new relationship provides positive public relations for the SMA and when fully developed, should increase the exposure of the Association in the schools.

New promotional efforts are already underway in the current year to increase membership in SMA.

One new program is referred to as "Member-Get-A-Member" in which a new member may give a complimentary membership to a colleague Beginning in the last fiscal year, membership

retention became an important focus of the membership staff. New programs to improve membership retention included: 1) distribution of "new member packets" to all new SMA members; introduction of a new benefits newsletter, "Member Services Update"; 3) evaluation and improvement of the telemarketing retention program; and 4) additional efforts to insure renewals of 1st and 2nd year members. Additional steps will be taken this fiscal year to improve retention rates of SMA members.

During 1988, a number of significant changes were made in the Southern Medical Association's Insurance Program in an effort to improve service to program participants and offer the best possible benefits at the lowest possible cost.

Of these changes, perhaps the most significant involved the successful move of third party administrative responsibilities to the SMA head-quarters. Beginning January 1, 1989, all administrative duties began to be handled by SMA Services, Inc. employees. To direct the Insurance Operations Area, Mr. Luke Hartsfield was employed as Insurance Operations Coordinator. Mr. Hartsfield assembled an outstanding staff of employees to perform all administrative duties including customer service, billing, collections and limited underwriting. The assumption of the third party administrative duties has been highly successful as evidenced by the high percentage of participants retained in the program.

In addition to the successful movement of the administrative duties, the Insurance Committee also made several other significant changes. Several rate adjustments were implemented during 1989

and an area rating concept was introduced. These changes will ensure the program's financial integri-

ty in the coming years.

A major coverage improvement in the program involved the elimination of the surgical schedule which was replaced by an 80%/20% payment method based on reasonable and customary charges. Other improvements included the addition of a Long Term Disability Plan III, the restructuring of Long Term Disability and Office Overhead age brackets to reflect five year breaks rather than the previous ten year breaks and the introduction of a quarterly billing schedule.

As a result of these significant changes, the program remains popular and competitive. The Coordinating Committee on Insurance, the staff and the SMA leadership, are eagerly anticipating additional program improvements and continued growth for

1990.

During 1988, the Southern Medical Association leadership approved a very significant change in the operation of the association's Physicians' Retirement Program. At the June meeting of the Coordinating Committee on Physicians' Retirement, committee members, under the leadership of Dr. Howard Kurzner, unanimously approved a plan

that would move the administration and marketing of both the Retirement and IRA programs in-house. The committee's recommendation was subsequently reviewed by the SMA Council at its summer meeting in July and unanimously approved.

The movement of the marketing and administration of the Retirement and IRA programs comes as a result of continued low member participation in both programs. In 1989, only slightly over 348 members out of a possible 55,000 were involved with the pension trust while only about 3,754 were involved with the IRA. Perhaps, however, the most serious problem is that the SMA continues to benefit only slightly financially from the program under the

present arrangement.

Once the in-house move was approved by the SMA leadership, the SMA Fringe Benefits staff immediately began the development of a plan to ensure the orderly transfer of the third party administrative duties from the present third party administrator to the in-house staff. The nationally known consulting firm of Mercer Meidinger Hansen Inc. was retained by the association to assist the staff in a study of the present structure of the Retirement and IRA programs and to determine the feasibility of successfully moving the programs inhouse. In addition, the consulting firm will assist the staff in the development of a plan to ensure the orderly transfer of these duties and the hiring of the personnel necessary to staff the operation.

Once the movement of the administration and marketing of the retirement program is successfully completed, the staff, the committee and the consultant will turn their attention to improving the pro-

gram's returns on investments.

Although the movement of the administrative responsibilities in-house is a significant change in the program, it is anticipated that a vast overall improvement in participation, marketing and customer service will result. The program improvements will be discussed in detail at the committee's meeting in Washington, D.C.

In February of this year a 401(K) tax sheltered program was established for employees of SMA Services, Inc. which provides an equivalent to the 403(B) tax sheltered annuity program available only to non-profit organizations. As an offset to this program, staff has also been busy recently filling the appropriate documents and enrollment forms to transfer Services employees out of SMA's Profit Sharing Retirement Plan into their own plan which will be called the SMA Services Employees' Money Purchase Pension Plan. All of the attributes of the two programs are the same. This action is in keeping with the Council action of a year ago directing staff to provide an equivalent benefits package for employees of the wholly owned subsidiary.

Also this year the Committee reviewed and revised the Employee Performance Evaluation form to include a formal evaluation of the achievement of objectives for Division Directors.

An employer contribution of \$147,305 was made during the plan year to the Employees' Profit Sharing Pension Plan in keeping with the guideline established by the Council in 1983. The current value of the plan assets is \$1,073,980 which includes interest earnings and amounts rolled over by employees from the previously existing defined benefit plan. Investment earnings of the plan were \$76,954 for the year, and distributions of \$30,575 were made to terminating and previously retired employees.

The Physicians' Purchasing Program recorded its most profitable year to-date with the end of the

1988-1989 fiscal year. Profits realized through the program totaled \$23,650 after sponsoring several educational programs during the year with contributions in excess of \$35,000.

Much time was devoted during the past year in program expansion and new marketing efforts. Eight new services were added, and our first attempt at a consumer item catalog was mailed in June.

The concept of a quarterly super special was introduced with the intent on attracting new participants into the purchasing program. This has proven to be quite successful with over 1,000 Mont Blanc ballpoint pens being sold—many to first time users of the program.

All new customers are mailed a thank you note with a questionnaire attached. The questionnaire allows them to critique the service and request additional information on other products. The idea is to make certain that first time customers become repeat customers. The program currently averages 65 new customers and 56 repeat customers per month. Each month, a mail piece containing 6 or 8 items with additional discounts is mailed to new and repeat customers from the previous three months. The purpose of this mailing is to show our appreciation to the membership that is utilizing this service by increasing the discounts on these select items.

At fiscal year's end, we had a total of 9,510 members who had paid the annual \$15 participation fee. We hope to increase this number by at least 5% during the current year by marketing the program to new members.

Much time will be spent again this coming fiscal year on program expansion and new marketing

campaigns.

One of the new programs already in the works for this year is a physicians' billing service, which is a program expansion of an existing agreement with Wismer\*Martin. This should be ready for marketing on a limited basis in November. We are also talking with several major providers in the banking industry about loan and lease products for the membership of Southern Medical Association. We will continuously seek new and meaningful products and services to offer through the Physicians' Purchasing Program.

Dr. Mell presented an update on the schedule of events, programs, speakers, and entertainment to be offered during the Washington meeting. He also went over the registration statistics for the Annual Meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

John F. Redman, M.D.

Dr. Redman announced that for the first time the Management By Objectives program was firmly integrated with the long range planning goals. He also mentioned the completion of the project to move the Insurance program in-house, and that membership of dues-paying physicians was 24,000.

#### REPORT OF THE **EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT**

Mr. William J. Ranieri

Mr. Ranieri announced that the association is on target and in good financial shape. He also briefly reviewed accomplishments in each department.

Tim Taylor distributed copies of the budget's First Quarter Update.

#### REPORT OF THE AD HOC **COMMITTEE ON BUDGET**

Thomas C. Rowland, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Rowland presented the report of the Ad Hoc Committee on Budget in the absence of Dr. Painter, the Committee Chairman. Dr. Rowland stated the Budget Committee had met twice by conference call. He distributed and discussed a list of proposed budget modifications. He also informed the Committee that the Budget Committee had reviewed the final report on the compensation study performed by TPF&C for senior staff. Several recommendations were received regarding changes in the overall package to keep the compensation package competitive for senior staff. The following actions were taken

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Executive Committee recommend that the Council consider taking 20% out of the General Fund and investing in the Equities Market. The motion carried

unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Dockery that the Executive Committee recommend that the Council consider the formation of a Coordinating Committee on Budget, consisting of the Chairman, President, Vice-Chairman, and one member from the Council to be appointed by the Chairman. The motion carried unanimously.

### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Mr. William J. Ranieri

In the absence of Dr. Letterman, Chairman, Dr. Redman asked Mr. Ranieri to give the report of the Standing Committee on Constitution and Bylaws.

Mr. Ranieri stated that the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws had met recently in Birmingham, and made the following recommendation:

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Executive Committee recommend that the Council accept the revised Articles of Incorporation as presented with the additional requirement that the Chairman of the Council also attest. The motion carried unanimously.

#### REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

Louis A. Cancellaro, M.D.

Dr. Cancellaro stated that the educational program continues to diversify and expand. He also stated that grant money of \$760,000 has been raised in the last year, and about 50,000 physicians have participated in our educational endeavors.

Dr. Cancellaro reviewed other actions of the Committee and highlighted the formation of a steering committee to analyze the possibilities of a new affiliate society in Geriatrics. He also made the

following recommendation:

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Cancellaro and seconded by Dr. Dockery that the Executive Committee recommend that a limit of three, one for each year, be placed on the number of loans and scholarships that a single individual be able to obtain from the Southern Medical Association Resident Loan Program. The motion carried unanimously.

#### REPORT OF THE VICE-CHAIRMAN

Thomas C. Rowland, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Rowland stated that he would present his formal report to the Council but did have two recommendations to present to the Executive Committee

in regards to the Auxiliary.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Dockery that the Executive Committee recommend to the Council that the President and President-Elect of the Auxiliary be invited to all Council meetings at the discretion of the President of SMA. The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Executive Committee recommend to the Council that a permanent staff person be appointed to assist the SMA Auxiliary in its administrative functions.

The motion carried unanimously.

#### REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

M. Pinson Neal, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Neal reported that at the request of the Audit Committee, the audit for 1988-1989 was much more detailed than previous audits. He also reported that the Management Letter provided a few minor conditions to which corrective action should be taken. He then presented the following recommendation to correct these conditions.

ACTION: —It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Crabtree that the Executive Committee recommend that the Council approve the audit and make the following recommendations:

A. That SMA set aside an additional \$150,000 in reserve for settlement of its IRS Tax Challenge.

B. That SMA note the following comments from the auditors in the management letter:

 To correct Advertising Accounts Receivable using the supplied internal ac-

counting controls.

 To segregate duties in SMA Services which would reduce the possibility of undetected errors and provide for independent review of the work performed.

To automate fixed asset accounting records, thereby eliminating the manual calculation of depreciation on a monthly basis.

 To implement an Accounts Payable modification and retain all voided checks for a period of at least one year.

 To improve Documentation of Expenses to avoid disallowance of the entertainment expenses by the IRS upon examination.

 To require written vendor quotes from Typography and Design.

 To make adjustments in Cash, Accounts Receivable, and the Cash Disbursement System.

 To enhance and define Control of EDP (Electronic Data Processing).

C. That the Board of SMA Services be restructured to include the SMA Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Executive Vice-President; An Attorney; A Bank Officer; A President or similar position, but most likely a physician, of a Medical School, who is a SMA member; and a Past President of SMA who is neither a trustee nor other officer of the SMA.

D. That SMA set as a goal cash reserves representing 18 months of revenue from dues.

E. That the Council continuously define the goals, responsibilities, and liabilities of SMA and SMA Services as they expand.

F. That subsequent audits of SMA Services' activities consider program cost effectiveness on a 2-3 year basis, with the first re-assessment to consider being the group purchasing program.

G. That professionals continue to handle SMA investments as long as they are managed within the quidelines of Council's Investment Policies.

H. That Mr. Ranieri, Tim Taylor, and Don Casey be commended for their excellent service to the association.

I. That Dr. Neal be commended on the excellent presentation of the Audit Committee's findings.

The motion carried unanimously.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Executive Committee recommend to the Council that a day be added to the Summer Meeting to assist in planning for the Long Range Planning Retreat. The motion carried unanimously.

#### ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee at this time, Dr. Redman adjourned the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Roger L. Mell, M.D.

Dr. Mell reviewed the social, educational and entertainment functions of the Annual Meeting. He introduced and gave special recognition to Dr. William H. Cooper, Chairman on Local Arrangements for the 83rd Annual Meeting.

Cooper welcomed everyone to Washington and briefly elaborated on some of the events to take place during the meeting.

Dr. Mell commended Dr. Redman for his work as Chairman of the Council during the past year. He also thanked Dr. Robert Klink, Chairman of the Committee on Scientific Activities, and Dr. Louis Cancellaro, Chairman of the Coordinating Committee on Education, for putting together such an outstanding educational program.

#### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

John F. Redman, M.D.

Dr. Redman thanked the Council for the opportunity to serve as its Chairman and reviewed his goals for the previous year as well as the accomplishments that had been made toward those goals.

He also introduced Dr. David Jacks, Dr. Terrell Tanner, and Dr. James Boland, Councilors-Elect,

and welcomed them to the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT

Mr. William J. Ranieri

Mr. Ranieri briefly presented the first quarter update on the Management By Objectives goals and

accomplishments.

He stated the Budget Committee met twice since the last meeting of the Council and called on Mr. Taylor to review the first quarter budget. Mr. Taylor also presented several proposed modifications and a complete revised budget for the Council's consideration. He also presented a 5-year budget projection.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Painter to approve the revised

budget as presented. The motion carried.

Mr. Taylor stated the Budget Committee also reviewed financial data on resource allocation from the American Society of Association Executives regarding other associations in comparison to the Southern Medical Association and presented it to the Council.

#### REPORT OF THE AUXILIARY ADVISOR

Thomas C. Rowland, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Rowland stated the Auxiliary had a very effective year. Its President, Mrs. Barbara Thibodeaux, visited 15 states and attended four medical meetings. The Auxiliary also sponsored a total of \$2,400 in Doctors' Day projects throughout the South.

He reminded the Council that at the Summer Meeting it approved an action allowing the Auxiliary President-Elect to attend a speaker's workshop and announced that Mrs. Janet Campbell did this in October. He also stated the Auxiliary Orientation for new Officers, Councilors and Vice-Councilors will be held in early 1990 at the SMA Headquarters Office.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the SMA Auxiliary President and President-Elect sit as invited guests at the discretion of the SMA President during all future Council meetings. The motion

carried.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that a recommendation to the Executive Vice-President to assign a permanent staff person whose primary responsibility will be to support the Auxiliary in the Headquarters Office subject to budget constraints be considered. The motion carried.

#### REPORT OF THE AUDIT COMMITTEE

M. Pinson Neal, Jr., M.D.

Dr. Neal announced SMA has attained an indepth audit, and he identified some key items the Audit Committee requested be reviewed. He also reviewed the position of SMA in a situation with the Internal Revenue Service and announced that SMA's accountants have recommended that SMA add to its reserve fund an additional \$150,000.

He reported that the duplication of the Board of SMA Services and the Council is a concern, stating that the income of each is such that common boards could jeopardize SMA's tax-free status.

It was recommended that the composition of the SMA Services Board be changed to include: (1) the Chairman of the Council, (2) the Vice-Chairman of the Council, (3) the Executive Vice-President, (4) an attorney, (5) a bank officer, (6) a President, Dean or Vice-President of a medical school who is an SMA member, and (7) a past president of the SMA who is neither a trustee nor other officer of SMA.

The Audit Committee also recommended the acceptance of a management letter and a management response from staff that address several inter-

nal management control functions.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded by Dr. Painter to approve the recommendations of the Audit Committee. The motion carried.

## REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

Louis A. Cancellaro, M.D.

Dr. Cancellaro referred the Council to the Committee's written report as presented and highlighted some of the activities taking place in education.

Dr. Cancellaro recognized Drs. Robert Klink, Edward Tomsovic, O. W. Dehart, and Joseph Painter, Standing Committee Chairmen; and Dr. John B. Thomison, Editor of the Journal; and the SMA Educational staff, for an outstanding job.

Dr. Cancellaro then called on Dr. Thomison who referred the Council to his written report as Editor.

**ACTION:**—It was moved by Dr. Cancellaro and seconded by Dr. Painter that a limit of three be placed on the number of loans a single individual be able to obtain from the SMA loan program. The motion carried.

## REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION

Joaquin S. Aldrete, M.D.

Dr. Aldrete stated that during the past year the Council approved several recommendations to change the Bylaws of the Association. He announced that a consultant had been obtained to work with staff on developing the Articles of Incorporation. He added the Bylaws are also in the process of being revised and will be submitted for approval at the 1990 annual meeting. The Articles will be presented to the membership during the First General Session here in Washington, but will lay on the table for one year and come up for approval also during the 1990 annual meeting. Dr. Aldrete then called on Dr. Letterman, Chairman of the Standing Committee on Constitution & Bylaws for additional comments.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Dockery to amend the Articles

presented to also state on Page 2, Article 6, Section 1, "there shall also be officers of each Section of the Association". The motion carried.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Dockery to amend the Articles presented to change the word "Chairman" to "President" and "Vice-Chairman" to "Chairman" in the signature section. The motion carried.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Dockery to amend the Articles to have them attested by two individuals, the Executive Vice-President and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The motion carried.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Dockery and seconded to approve the Articles of Incorporation

as amended. The motion carried.

Dr. Aldrete then presented the Report of the Standing Committee on Long Range Planning. He stated that at the last Summer Meeting, the Management By Objectives program was approved and fully integrated by the Council. He stated that the Committee also discussed any long-range goals for the Association to be set and identified for a period of three to five years. He announced the Committee has also begun groundwork for the next Long Range Planning Retreat to be held in 1991.

Dr. Aldrete then presented the report of the Standing Committee on Employees' Pension Plan and announced that in February a 401K plan was instituted for the employees of SMA Services, Inc. comparable to the plan held by the Southern Medical Association. He stated that staff has been busy transferring these employees' old plans into the new plan. He announced the current value of the plan is \$1,073,000, and during the year its investment earnings totaled \$76,000 and disbursements to retiring or leaving employees totaled \$30,500. He also stated the Committee reviewed and approved the performance evaluation for the division directors and that the staff has put together and distributed a new employee handbook.

## REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON SHARED SERVICES

Robert L. Baldwin, M.D.

Dr. Baldwin referred the Council to the Committee's formal written report, but offered the following highlights. The Physicians' Purchasing Program experienced a 14% increase over last year's figures in program participation. He stated physician-outside sales are up and over 1/3 of all orders are from previous customers. Consumer related items continue to gain popularity. He also reviewed the overall financial status of the program.

## REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Paul B. Lansing, M.D.

Dr. Lansing reported that as of October 1, the major medical program has been upgraded and changed to a modern geographically-distributed type of payment schedule. Major medical program rates increased 15% as of October 1. The new LTD III program has improved SMA's disability benefits and has been well received by our membership. For both the July and October billing cycles we had a 96% collection rate.

In order to increase the marketability of our plan, the Committee presented several recommendations to the Council for changes to the medical plan.

ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Crabtree that the Major Medical Plan be amended by the addition of \$3,000 and \$5,000 deductible amounts. The motion carried.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that a "Physicians' Courtesy" Medical Plan be instituted with hospital benefits only and an appropriately discounted rate schedule. The motion carried.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Stephenson that a Preferred Risk medical plan be developed for marketing to nonsmoking young physicians at an appropriately discounted rate schedule. The motion carried.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Lansing and seconded by Dr. Barnett that a Long Term Care Plan be added to the current SMA disability package as a free-standing new product. The mo-

tion carried.

He also reported that the contract with Connecticut General has been renegotiated for a reduced retention factor with the carrier which is expected to result in a \$60,000 expense reduction for the program.

#### REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON PHYSICIANS' RETIREMENT

Howard Kurzner, M.D.

Dr. Kurzner reported that at its Summer Meeting the Council granted permission to hire a consultant to study the feasibility of bringing the retirement program in-house. He announced that Mercer Meidinger and Hansen have subsequently been hired and have made a preliminary report with a final report to come in the next few weeks.

He stated the retirement program maintains a total of 348 members. It is hoped that after the consultant report is received, marketing techniques can be established to raise this figure substantially over

the next few years.

He also announced a new 9.5% rate for the pension trust fund. The IRA fund has also been raised to 8.5%. We are also in a very good position from a market value standpoint.

Dr. Kurzner also announced that during the Washington meeting, Connecticut General will sponsor a retirement luncheon seminar.

#### REPORT OF THE COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON **MEMBERSHIP**

J. Edward Hill, M.D.

Dr. Hill referred the Council to the Committee's written report and reported that overall membership increased by 208 active dues-paying members. Student and Resident membership increased substantially over years past. The complimentary program continues to do well with a 7.3% conversion rate for a total of 930 new dues-paying members this past year.

Dr. Hill presented a letter and curriculum vitae application for Class IV membership from John A.

Blessing, Ph.D.
ACTION:—It was moved by Dr. Hill and seconded by Dr. Strahan to accept the application of John A. Blessing, Ph.D. for Class IV membership in the Association. The motion carried.

#### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL AWARDS

Jim C. Barnett, M.D.

Dr. Barnett stated the Committee met to review the nominations received for the three awards presented annually by the Association. He added that this year more nominations were received than ever before for all three awards. From the Committee's recommendations, the Council made the following actions:

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the SMA Distinguished Service Award, in recognition of outstanding contributions to the advancement of medical science and/or the Association, be presented to Dr. Hiram C. Polk, of Louisville, Kentucky. The motion carried.

ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Original Research Award, in recognition of original research in clinical medicine or the basic sciences as applied to medicine, be presented to Dr. David Bilheimer, of Dallas, Texas. The motion carried.

No selection was made by the Council for the

Seale Harris Award.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Barnett and seconded by Dr. Cancellaro that a proposal be prepared to increase efforts to obtain additional nominees for the annual awards of the Association. The motion carried.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Barnett and seconded by Dr. Cancellaro that each member of the Council be invited to submit one name each year for each of the special awards. The motion

Dr. Rowland stated that one of the recommendations of the Budget Committee from its recent meeting was to form a Standing Committee on the

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Crabtree to form a Standing Committee on the Budget to include the President, Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and one member of the Council to be appointed to the Committee by the

Council Chairman. The motion carried.

Dr. Rowland also announced that the 1990 Summer Meeting will be held at the Chateau Whistler Resort north of Vancouver, July 18-22. He stated that during its meeting the Executive Committee had approved a recommendation to be made to the Council to extend the meeting an additional day in order to allow time for a meeting regarding the Long Range Planning Retreat next year.

ACTION:-It was moved by Dr. Rowland and seconded by Dr. Dockery to extend the 1990 Summer Meeting one additional day to allow time to plan for the Long Range Planning Retreat to be held in

1991. The motion carried.

Dr. Redman and the entire Council then recognized Dr. Dockery for his nine years of service

Dr. Tomsovic reminded the Council that at its last meeting a recommendation was forwarded to the Committee on Publications and Advertising to establish a volume of the work done by Dr. John Thomison over the years. Dr. Tomsovic reported that the amount of work done by Dr. Thomison is quite substantial and requested the Council's thoughts on proceeding with the project. Staff presented information on the costs involved in undertaking the project including typesetting, printing and binding. Several different suggestions and alternatives were offered.

#### CALL TO ORDER

The First General Session of the 83rd Annual Scientific Assembly of the Southern Medical Association was held in the Independence Ballroom H & I of the Grand Hyatt Hotel with approximately 100 members in attendance. Roger L. Mell, M.D., President of the Association, called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.

Dr. Mell welcomed those in attendance, and commented on the Association's sustained growth over the years. He also recognized the past presidents of the Association in attendance, and thanked them

for their continued support.

Dr. Mell called for a moment of silence in memory of Dr. Andrew Moore, who passed away in July of this year. Dr. Moore was a past president of the SMA from 1974 to 1975.

#### REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

John F. Redman, M.D.

Dr. Redman reviewed his goals and the progress made toward those goals over the last year. He also covered the development of tangible objectives along with an implementation plan to bring the long

range goals of the Council to fruition.

#### REPORT OF THE EDITOR

John B. Thomison, M.D.

The meeting was called to order by the Editor at 8:00 a.m. Copies of the Editor's Report to the Council were distributed for review and discussion

Dr. Thomison welcomed new member Dr. Mabry

to his first Editorial Board meeting

At Dr. Thomison's request, Dr. Bellande briefly summarized the current status of the Journal's computerized manuscript tracking system, stating that the only part of the program not yet in complete use is the Editor's reviewer file. With minor modifications, that file should also be fully functional within the next six months

Dr. Thomison announced that Dr. Randolph Batson, who has served on the Editorial Board for many years, is retiring and that Dr. Edward Tomsovic, Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Oklahoma in Tulsa, wishes to replace him. Dr. Thomison also said that Dr. Ollie Dehart (Vinita, Okla.) and Dr. O'Neill Barrett (Columbia, S.C.) have expressed their desire to serve in their respective fields of family practice and general internal medicine

ACTION:-It was moved and seconded that those three nominations be submitted for approval by the Executive Committee of the Council. The mo-

Dr. Thomison reviewed the new requirements of the Journal of the American Medical Association designed to avoid misrepresentation, misconduct, or fraud by stiffening the ethics standards for prospective authors. JAMA now requires authors to produce their raw study data upon request, to take

public responsibility for the validity of their work, and to disclose potential financial conflicts of interest. There was a consensus among those present that to protect its own credibility, the Southern Medical Journal also should require its authors to stand behind their work, to justify their place in the byline (thus eliminating "honorary authorship"), and to inform the Editor of any commercial interests in their work. To strengthen the Journal's legal position with regard to such requirements, the Association's attorney was recently asked to develop a Manuscript Submission Agreement, copies of which were distributed for discussion. After reviewing the Agreement, several members suggested that the document's language could be less legalistic and still get the point across, whereas others commented that such legal writing might better convey how seriously the Journal reveres integrity in the scientific process. Dr. Thomison asked all members of the Board to take their copy of the proposed Agreement with them so that they could evaluate it and suggest changes. Dr. Bellande also pointed out that the Information for Authors, published in each issue of the Journal, has been revised by staff, both to improve its appearance and readability and to explain the new Manuscript Submission Agreement, which will be sent to corresponding authors upon receipt of submitted articles.

Dr. Thomison then invited Dr. Blum to present his proposal for publishing occasional theme issues of the *Journal*, which Dr. Blum described as a creative attempt to gather a series of articles on a chosen subject. Dr. Blum said that during his editorship of the New York State Journal of Medicine, four theme issues had been published - two on smoking, one on violence, and one on minorities — and that they had been well received. He added that after each theme issue was published and indexed, the journal continued to be identified with that particular topic and to receive further related submissions. He also stated that if the concept is approved, he will find someone who can put together such an issue. Questions raised by Board members were: How would the topic be decided upon? Should a multispecialty journal commit an entire issue to a subject that many of its readers might consider unrelated to their practice or their medical interests? Should the Journal survey its readership to determine interest and to obtain suggestions for topics? Dr. Scoville proposed that the Board defer action to

allow its members time for reflection.

ACTION:-It was moved that Dr. Cancellaro present to the Council the proposal for a theme issue of the Journal and that he ask members of the Council to suggest topics if they show interest. The mo-

tion was seconded and it carried.

Dr. Thomison asked members for their opinions on reference limitations. Although the Information for Authors has heretofore advised that references should generally not exceed 20 in number, and though most Case Reports have been limited to about ten, Dr. Thomison said that he often uses the editor's prerogative, allowing longer reference lists for some Primary Articles, for special categories (eg. Review Articles), and even for Case Reports that include a review of the literature. Dr. Blum agreed with the rule to limit the number of references for Case Reports, but voiced his opinion

that any limitation for Primary Articles cuts off the supply of original research submitted.

supply of original research submitted.
ACTION:—It was moved and seconded that the Editor continue to use his own discretion as to appropriate number of references for a given article, that the revised Information for Authors omit any statement specifying an allowable number of references, and that referees be asked to note ex-

cessive references as part of their review of manuscripts. The motion carried.

# ISTITUTION VD BYLAWS

Southern Medical Association

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### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I—NAME

The name and title of this organization shall be the SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION (a non-profit organization) chartered under the laws of the State of Alabama, and its domicile shall be in Birmingham, Alabama.

### ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purposes of the Southern Medical Association shall be to develop and foster the art and science of medicine by:

A) developing and promoting initiatives in medical education

 B) providing practice-related services to enhance the ability of the members of the Association to serve their patients

C) providing activities which encourage membership and collegial interaction among the members of the Association

The Association shall not at any time take active part in any political or sectarian questions or take concerted action for securing legislative enactments.

### ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Active Members. The membership of this Association shall be by invitation to physicians who are eligible to be members of the following state medical societies: Alabama, Arkansas, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, who are sponsored by the respective state Councilor, to invited medical officers of the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Public Health Service and Veterans Administration on active duty, and to invited members of the Puerto Rico Medical Association who are citizens of the United States of America.

SECTION 2. Associate and Emeritus Members. This Association may have such classes of associate and emeritus membership as may be provided for in the BYLAWS of this CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Officers of the Association. The officers of the Association shall be a President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Trustees, Councilors, an Executive Vice-President, an Editor of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL, and Section Officers.

SECTION 2. Elected Officers. (A) General Officers. The President-Elect and Vice-President of the Association shall be elected annually at the first general session of an annual meeting. All elections shall be made by the type of ballot (secret, voice, or raising of hands) as the majority of those members present may desire. A majority of the votes shall be necessary for election. If no one receives a majority of the votes cast the member receiving the smallest number of votes shall be dropped and the balloting shall be repeated. A list of nominees for President-

Elect and Vice-President shall be submitted to the Council by the Committee on Selections. The submission of such a list does not preclude nominations from the floor. The results of these nominations along with the report of the Council shall be submitted to the membership as the final order of business at the last general session of an annual meeting.

- (B) Trustees. The Trustees shall be six in number and shall be elected by the Council, one each year, to serve for a period of six years. The oldest member in point of service shall be the Chairman.
- (C) Section Officers. The officers of each Section shall consist of a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary, and when so desired by the members of the Section, a Chairman-Elect as an additional officer or in place of the Vice-Chairman, elected annually by the members of the respective Sections at a regular session of the Section during an annual meeting. Section Officers assume office at the end of the annual meeting during which they were elected and should be members of the Association.

SECTION 3. Appointed Officers. (A) Administrative Officers. An Executive Vice-President, and an Editor of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL shall be selected by the Council, with salaries, duties, and tenure of office to be determined by the Council.

(B) Councilors. The Councilors shall be appointed by the President, one from each of the states enumerated in ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP, SECTION 1. Active Members, and shall serve for five years, and shall not be eligible for reappointment, the Councilor terms expiring with the close of annual meetings. This Section shall become effective as of 1933, the Councilor terms to expire as follows: Group 1: (1933) Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma; Group 2: (1934) Arkansas, District of Columbia, Georgia; Group 3: (1935) Florida, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia; Group 4: (1936) Maryland, Missouri, North Carolina; Group 5: (1937) Alabama, Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia. In the event a vacancy occurs on the Council the President in office at the time the vacancy occurs shall appoint a successor to fill the unexpired term. The successor may be eligible to be appointed to serve a full term as Councilor, succeeding himself. Collectively, the Council shall be the governing body of the Association. It shall have jurisdiction over all questions involving the rights and standings of members, whether in relation to other members or to this Association. All matters brought before the general sessions or Sections shall be referred to the Council for consideration.

### ARTICLE V-SCIENTIFIC ACTIVITIES

SECTION 1. Annual Meetings. The Association shall hold an annual meeting during which there shall be not less than two general sessions, one of which may be devoted to the business of the Association and restricted exclusively to the membership when so determined by the Council or by the Executive Committee of the Council or upon a petition filed by not less than twenty-five members of the Association; there may be meetings of the Executive Committee of the Council and the Council, scientific Section sessions, technical and scientific exhibits, and such general programs as may be arranged by

the Section Officers in cooperation with the Committee on Scientific Work. All expenses of an annual meeting shall be borne by the Association. The time and place for holding each annual meeting shall be fixed by the Council.

SECTION 2. Scientific Sections. The scientific Sections of this Association shall be: Section on Allergy, Section on Anesthesiology, Section on Colon and Rectal Surgery, Section on Dermatology, Section on Gastroenterology, Section on Family Practice, Section on Gynecology, Section on Medicine, Section on Neurology, Neurosurgery, and Psychiatry, Section on Obstetrics, Section on Oncology, Section on Ophthalmology, Section on Otolaryngology, Section on Pathology, Section on Pediatrics, Section on Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, Section on Radiology, Section on Surgery, Section on Cology, and such other Sections as the Association may from time to time create or provide for.

SECTION 3. Publications. The Association shall own and publish the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL which shall be the official organ of the Association and other such publications which may be provided for by the Association. The Association may designate such ownerships of publications as deemed advisable.

### ARTICLE VI-SEAL

The Association shall have a common seal, with power to break, change, or renew the same at pleasure.

### ARTICLE VII—AMENDMENTS

The Association may at any annual meeting amend any Article of this CONSTITUTION by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members present and voting at general session of that meeting, provided the amendment has been presented in writing and laid on the table at the previous annual meeting.

### **BYLAWS**

### CHAPTER 1-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Active Members. Physicians who satisfy requirements as set forth in ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP, SECTION 1. Active Members, of the CONSTITUTION and who are eligible to vote and hold office in their respective state or district societies shall be active members. Also, physicians who serve as full-time faculty members of accredited medical schools located within the Association's territory as defined in ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP, SECTION 1. Active members; of the CONSTITUTION, shall be active members. These members shall have full privileges of Association membership; including the right to hold office and vote and receive the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL. Active members shall pay full dues to the Association, either annually or by payment of a life membership fee. Active members may be excused from the payment of Association dues for one of the following reasons: financial hardship or extended illness, postgraduate training, defined as that period during which a member participates in an organized training course within a hospital, being retired from active practice, or on temporary service as full-time commissioned medical officers in the reserve Armed Forces. Active members excused from the payment of Association dues shall have the right to vote and hold office, but shall not receive the **SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOUR**-NAL, except by personal subscription. Nothing in this or following Sections shall be construed to be retroactive to affect previously classified honorary members.

SECTION 2. Associate Members. The Association may have five classes of associate members:

Class 1. A member who has moved from the territory of the Association;

Class 2. A physician from outside the territory of the Association;

Class 3. An intern or resident not yet a member of a state medical society and medical students of the medical schools in the member states.

Class 4. An individual not holding a degree of Doctor of Medicine, but who is on the teaching staff of a medical school or engaged in research, practice or promotion of a science allied to medicine and holding a degree in a subject commonly referred to as a basic science or in dentistry. Each applicant for this Class of Membership must be reviewed individually by the Councilor of the respective applicant's state of origin, and then submitted to the council for its action.

Class 5. A layman who has rendered meritorious service to the profession or to humanity.

To be eligible for associate membership, under Classes 2, 3, and 4, a person must satisfy the requirements as set forth in CHAPTER 1—MEMBERSHIP, SECTION 1. Active Members, except eligible for membership in a state or district society in the case of Classes 3 and 4, and holding the degree of Doctor of Medicine in the case of medical students. Associate members under Classes 4 and 5 shall be recommended for membership by the Council.

Under Classes 1, 2, and 3 individuals may be accepted for associate membership by the Executive Vice-President, their eligibility under the provisions of this Section have been determined. Associate members shall not hold office nor be entitled to vote. Associate members under Classes 1, 2, and 4 shall pay regular annual dues and shall receive the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL. Associate members under Classes 3 and 5 shall not pay dues, not receive the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL except by personal subscription.

SECTION 3. Emeritus Members. An active member in good standing who is over 70 years of age and who has been a member for a period of twenty-five years is eligible for emeritus membership. Emeritus members shall not pay dues but shall enjoy all privileges of the Association, but shall not hold office.

SECTION 4. Application for Membership. Application for membership in this Association shall be made in writing. The Association reserves the right to accept or reject any application for membership.

SECTION 5. Termination of Membership. Any member who is under sentence of suspension or expulsion from his state or local society shall automatically forfeit his membership in this Association. The Association may at any annual meeting on recommendation of the Council suspend or expel any member of the Association by a majority vote of those present at the last general session of that meeting.

### **CHAPTER 2—DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. President. The President shall preside, or designate who shall preside, at all general sessions of an annual meeting and all functions at which the Association is host. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise arranged for, and may deliver an annual address at the general session to be held at a time and place decided upon by the Executive Committee of the Council. In meetings of the Council he shall cast a deciding vote in case of a tie. He shall perform such other duties as the definition of his office requires. The program for the general scientific sessions shall be formulated by the Committee on Scientific Work in consultation with the President and the Executive Committee of the Council. The President shall have authority to create commissions or committees for scientific investigations of special interest and importance to the profession and the public. He should receive and dispose of these reports in the proper channels. Any expenses incurred in such an operation must be approved by the Executive Committee of the Council. The president shall appoint, on nomination by the respective Councilor, five Associate Councilors from each state or district. After consultation with any host society of Annual Meetings, he shall appoint members of the Association to carry out duties of local arrangements.

SECTION 2. President-Elect. The President-Elect shall assist the President in the discharge of his duties and keep himself informed on the affairs of the Association. In the event of the death of the President-Elect, his successor shall be elected by the vote of the Council after receiving nominations from the Committee on Selections. SECTION 3. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall assist the President in the discharge of his duties and in the event of his death, resignation, or removal, shall succeed him. He shall also perform such other duties as may be assigned to him under the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS.

SECTION 4. Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall serve as the Auditing Committee to review the financial audit and shall convene before or at the annual meeting for this purpose. They shall also submit an Annual Audit Report to the Executive Vice-President, Chairman of the Council, and President. Any action authorized to be done by the Trustees within the limitations of this Section shall be binding if done by a majority thereof.

### SECTION 5. Council.

- (A) Composition of the Council. The Council shall be composed of the seventeen Councilors and the following officers: President, President-Elect, Vice-President, and Immediate Past President.
- (B) Conveyances. All conveyances of real property of the Association shall be authorized by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the Council, and deeds or conveyances of real property shall be executed on behalf of the Association by any two of the following Officers of the Association: the President, the President, the Vice-President, or the Chairman of the Council.
- (C) Meetings. The Council shall hold sessions as seem necessary during or immediately preceding an annual meeting of the Association, and at such other time as necessity may require, subject to the call of the Chairman or on petition of three Councilors. In the event of any regularly appointed Councilor being unable to attend the annual meeting, the Chairman of the Council shall appoint an alternate to serve for that meeting. At each annual meeting a Chairman and Vice-Chairman for the succeeding year shall be elected. Through its Chairman, the Council shall make an annual report to the Association at the last general session of an annual meeting. The Vice-Chairman shall act as Parliamentarian for all meetings of the Council.
- (D) Executive Committee. There shall be an Executive Committee of the Council to represent the Association and Council between the Council meetings to consider special matters as would come before the Council and report its findings and conclusions to the Council. Any matters of such urgency that they should not wait over until the Council meeting may be acted upon by the Executive Committee of the Council. The Executive Committee of the Council shall consist of nine or ten members: The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Council, who shall serve as Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Council, the Immediate Past President, President, President-Elect, and Vice-President of the Association, and three (or four) additional Councilors, appointed by the Chairman in rotation alphabetically by name one (or two) from each of the classes not represented by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman such that each Councilor shall serve at least one year on the Executive Committee. At the Annual Meeting, the Council will elect a Vice-Chairman in the following manner: Prior to the annual meeting, the Chairman of the Selections Committee shall contact all of the eligible candidates from the Class of Councilors completing their third year to ascertain their willingness to serve in the capacity of Vice-Chairman. At the annual meeting such Councilors' names will be presented to the Council. Voting on those names shall be done by the Council by secret ballot. The votes will be counted by the

President of the Association, the Chairman of the Council, and the Chairman of the Committee on Selections. Votes in absentia shall not be permitted. The person receiving the highest number of votes will become Vice-Chairman. The President shall withhold his vote and cast it only in case of a tie between the candidates receiving the most votes. The Executive Committee of the Council may meet as often and at such places as the Chairman or four members of the Executive Committee of the Council may decide, except that one meeting each year must be held in Birmingham. This Committee will be the Advisory Committee to the Auxiliary of the Association. Expenses of this Committee in attending meetings on behalf of the Association shall be borne by the Association. The Executive Committee of the Council shall serve as Finance Coordinator of Committee Chairmen's Budgets and work with the Executive Vice-President in Budget Studies, and in the development and supervision of the annual budget, and shall consider all unappropriated or unbudgeted expenses before such items are considered by the Council. The financial and investment policy shall be reviewed and revised annually as appropriate.

(E) Associate Councilors. Five Associate Councilors shall be appointed from each state by the President. It shall be the duty of the Associate Councilors to stimulate interest in all activities of the Southern Medical Association and assist their respective Councilor in any way requested.

SECTION 6. Executive Vice-President. The Executive Vice-President shall be the chief administrative officer of the Association. His special areas of responsibility shall be:

- (A) Supervision of Employees. He shall employ and direct all staff personnel (full and part-time) including the assignment of duties of such employees except the employees under the direct supervision of the Editor.
- (B) Promotion and Records. With the cooperation of the Council and all other officers, he shall seek at all times to expand the membership and interests of the Association. He shall keep or cause to be kept, the official minutes of the transactions of the Association as the Council may direct, and not otherwise provided. He shall conduct the official correspondence and shall be the custodian of all official records and papers of the Association.
- (C) Director of Finance and Budgetary Control. As chief finance officer of the Association, he shall receive all funds, including bequests and donations, and deposit the same to the credit of the Treasurer or to other officially designated funds or accounts. He shall direct the general bookkeeping and accounting system and shall render an annual financial report to the Council. He shall prepare and recommend an annual budget to the Council. Said budget, when amended and adopted by the Council, shall determine the expenditure of funds during the ensuing fiscal year, and shall not be amended without the approval of the Council. All expenses of the Association shall be paid by check signed by the Executive Vice-President. He shall secure an annual audit of the books of account by a certified public accountant, approved by the Council, which audit report shall be transmitted to the Council as a part of his financial report. He shall be bonded in favor of the Association in an amount determined by the Council, with the premium cost of such bond to be paid by the Association.
- (D) Managing Editor of the Journal. He shall act as Managing Editor of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL

JOURNAL and other publications of the Association.

(E) Production of Revenue. He shall plan and direct all activities related to the production of revenue for the Association, including the business management of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL and other publications, establishing and maintaining advertising policies, subject to the prior approval of the Editor or any committee or agency so designated by the Council, securing advertising, executing and enforcing contracts for printing, and supervising production of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL.

(F) Director of Technical Exhibits. He shall plan and direct the technical exhibits for the annual sessions in accordance with basic policy established by the Council or Executive Committee of the Council.

(G) Director of Scientific Exhibits. He shall plan and direct the scientific exhibits for the annual sessions. All proposed exhibits shall be approved by the Editor or such other committee or agency designated by the Council in order to secure professional and educational evaluation prior to the sessions.

(H) Physical Facilities for Annual Sessions. He shall review invitations for annual meeting sites and secure necessary facilities for holding the annual sesions, shall execute necessary contracts and agreements for proper and adequate space, and shall advise the Executive Committee of the Council and the Council with respect to the availability of adequate facilities for the annual sessions.

(I) Delegation of Authority. He may designate staff employees by appropriate titles and may delegate to them any portions of the above responsibilities.

SECTION 7. Treasurer. The offices of the Executive Vice-President and Treasurer may be combined and vested in the same person at the discretion of the Council. If the offices be separate, the Treasurer shall be selected by the Council which shall determine his salary, duties, and tenure of office. He shall give bond in an amount determined by the Council, with the premium of said bond to be paid by the Association. He shall receive all funds from the Executive Vice-President and deposit the same in a bank or banks located in the domicile of the Association. Such depositories shall be designated by and with the consent of the Committee on Finance and the Council. He shall sign all checks drawn on the Association for sums provided for in the annual budget.

**SECTION 8. Editor.** The Editor shall have the following areas of responsibility:

(A) He shall be responsible for the non-advertising portion of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL, and other publications of the Association, including the preparation of editorials, the selection and editing of scientific articles, and the general format with approval of the Executive Vice-President.

(B) He may appoint, or recommend the employment of, assistant or associate editors and/or an Editorial Board with the consent of the Council.

(C) He will review, or cause to be reviewed, any books which in his discretion merit the publication of a review in the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL.

(D) With the consent of the Executive Vice-President he shall establish practical mechanics for handling manuscripts and other materials for publication.

(E) He may, with the consent of the Council, employ necessary secretarial assistance.

### SECTION 9. Section Officers.

(A) Chairman. The Chairman shall preside at the meetings of the Section and shall perform such duties as may be provided by the rules of the Section. He shall be responsible for selecting and inviting the Section's official guest speaker and shall cooperate with the Secretary in arranging the Section program for an annual meeting.

(B) Vice-Chairman. The Vice-Chairman shall assist the Chairman in his duties and preside over the Section meetings in the absence of the Chairman.

(C) Secretary. The Secretary shall arrange the Section program for an annual meeting in cooperation with the Chairman and in acordance with rules and regulations set forth in the Association's CON-STITUTION and BYLAWS. The Secretary shall be the official correspondent with reference to the program with the headquarters office, maintain the Section's official records, consult with the Executive Vice-President to determine if the prospective nominees for Section officers are eligible to hold office prior to their nomination, and shall be responsible for collecting papers presented at an annual meeting and forwarding them, along with the list of newly elected Section officers, to the headquarters office. The Secretary shall attend the annual Section Secretaries' Conference to be held each winter, as soon as practical after the annual meeting, for the purpose of formulating the general schedule of scientific sessions for the annual meeting in cooperation with the Committee on Scientific Work. The Association shall reimburse the Section Secretary for expenses incurred in attending the Section Secretaries' Conference. The Chairman and Secretary of the Sections may be invited to meet with the President and the Committee on Scientific Work immediately preceding or during each annual meeting.

(D) Secretary-Elect. The Secretary-Elect shall make himself acquainted with the duties of the Secretary and attend the Section Secretaries' Conference.

(E) Steering Committee. Each scientific Section shall have a formal Steering Committee made up of the current Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, the Chairman-Elect, if this office is utilized by the Section, and the three immediate past Chairmen. The duties of the Section Steering Committee shall include: aid in planning the work of the Section; evaluation of papers read before the Section for possible publication; serve as a Section nominating committee; fill vacancies that occur among Section officers and perform such other duties from time to time as they appear necessary.

### **CHAPTER 3—COMMITTEE STRUCTURE**

SECTION 1. Coordinating Committees. There shall be six Coordinating Committees to be known as the Coordinating Committee on Education, the Coordinating Committee on Membership, the Coordinating Committee on Insurance, the Coordinating Committee on Physicians' Retirement Program, the Coordinating Committee on Shared Services, and the Coordinating Committee on Administration. The chairman of each Coordinating Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Council annually, but no person shall be eligible to serve more than five consecutive years. Each of the Coordinating Committees shall have from three to nine members appointed annually by the Chairman of the Council. The Chairman of each Standing Committee and each Ad Hoc Committee shall be made a member of the appropriate Coordinating Committee, but no person shall be eligible to serve for more than six consecutive years as a committee member, except the Chairman. No person shall serve more than eight years as combined member and chairman. The Chairman of the Council is charged to provide continuity of these committees when making appointments. The President and the Chairman of the Council shall be ex officio members of all Coordinating Committees. Each Coordinating Committee shall report in writing each year to the Executive Committee its activities and budget.

It shall be the duty of:

- (A) the Coordinating Committee on Education to coordinate the activities of the Committee on Scientific Work, the Committee on Grants, Loans, and Scholarships, the Committee on Publications and Advertising, the Committee on Multi-Media Programs, and such Ad Hoc Committees as shall be annually assigned to it.
- (A-1) Committee on Scientific Work. This Committee shall be vested with the responsibility for the formulation and content of the scientific activities of the Annual Meeting. The Committee shall include in its scope of activities the following: (a) the format and content of the scientific sessions of the annual meeting; (b) the development and assignment of a scientific theme or themes for the annual meeting in cooperation with the Section Secretaries; (c) the design and nature of postgraduate courses, workshops, specialty and multi-disciplinary programs for the Annual Meeting; (d) the Committee shall maintain liaison with: 1. medical school faculties and students in the site of the Annual Meeting; 2. specialty and subspecialty organizations; 3. allied health science organizations, and cooperate with them, in developing and design of scientific programs and continuing education activities; (e) the Committee shall be responsible for the selection and judging of scientific exhibits shown at the Annual Meeting; (f) the Committee shall be responsible for monitoring and evaluating scientific activities of the Annual Meeting; (g) the Committee shall serve as an advisory group to the Section Secretaries in developing their Section specialty programs and coordinating and assisting the Secretaries in arranging combined Section meetings.
- (A-2) Committee on Grants, Loans, and Scholarships. It shall be the duty of this Committee to formulate and recommend policies and criteria for awarding grants, loans, and scholarships. It shall review all applications and determine the recipients of the grants, loans, and scholarships available through the Association at a meeting to be held annually after the deadline for receiving applications. The Committee may be composed of members who are representative of the specialties of medicine at the discretion of the Chairman of the Council.
- (A-3) Committee on Publications and Advertising. This Committee shall review all items advertised in any publication of the Association and has the prerogative of rejecting any items of questionable merit. This Committee is responsible for supervising all publications of the Southern Medical Association acting in both a regulatory and advisory capacity. The Editor(s) and the Executive Vice-President shall serve as ex officio members of the Committee, which will consist of three members appointed from the Editorial Board by the Editor.
- (A-4) Committee on Multi-Media Programs. Its duties shall be: (a) Dial Access. As availability and needs arise, new programs shall be selected and negotiated with authors, editors, and sponsors. All

- existing programs shall be reviewed on a regular basis, so that material presented is current. Minor or major changes shall be made as necessary to maintain the newest and best material. The Dial Access Ready Reference Catalog shall be maintained and updated whenever necessary. (b) Video Access. Production facilities, marketing methods, and scientific material for videocassette programs shall be reviewed on an annual basis.
- (B) the Coordinating Committee on Membership to coordinate the activities of the Committee on Special Awards, Committee on Selections, and such Ad Hoc Committees as shall be annually assigned to it.
- (B-1) Committee on Special Awards. A confidential Committee on Special Awards consisting of five members with the Vice-President as Chairman, shall be appointed by the President to evaluate the contributions of the various candidates for special awards. If suitable candidates are selected by the Committee, it shall submit the names of not more than three such members to the Council for each award. The Council may elect one for each respective award and presentation of awards will take place at the Second General Session of that annual meeting.
- (B-2) Committee on Selections. It shall be the duty of this Committee to seek, receive, and consider names for all elected officers with the exception of the Section Officers. The members of this Committee shall consist of one Councilor representing each group of Councilors (total of five), as defined in Article IV, Section 3 of the Constitution, and two members at large who may be, but are not necessarily, Councilors. The Chairman shall be appointed by the President from one of the above. The Chairman of this Committee must be made known to the general membership so that nominations for elective officers can be submitted to him at least thirty days prior to the first annual meeting of the Council. A list of nominees shall be submitted to the Council as described in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS, SECTION 2. Elected Officers. The appointment to this Committee will be on an annual basis, but no person shall be eligible to serve more than two consecutive annual terms.
- (C) the Coordinating Committee on Insurance to periodically review the insurance program of the Association and to work in liaison with the administrator and/or underwriters, to ensure the success of the program, and to see that the interests of participants are adequately protected.
- (D) the Coordinating Committee on Physicians' Retirement Program to periodically review the Physicians' Retirement Program of the Association and to work in liaison with the SMA Staff.
- (E) the *Coordinating Committee on Shared Services* to coordinate the activities of such Ad Hoc Committees as shall be annually assigned to it.
- (F) the Coordinating Committee on Administration to coordinate the activities of the Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, the Committee on the Employees' Pension Plan and Personnel, the Committee on History, the Committee on Long Range Planning and such Ad Hoc Committees as shall be annually assigned to it.
- (F-1) Committee on Constitution and Bylaws. It will be the duty of this Committee to periodically review the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS, to receive suggestions from members of the Association relative to any changes which should be made,

and to bring the suggested changes before the Coordinating Committee on Administration for approval and recommendations to the Council.

(F-2) Committee on the Employees' Pension Plan and Personnel. It shall be the duty of this Committee to regularly review, at least annually, the Employees' Pension Plan and suggest any changes which might improve employee benefits. Any problems which arise relative to personnel employed by the Association should be reviewed as they arise and settled as soon as possible.

(F-3) Committee on History. It will be the duty of this Committee to add to the existing history items of interest relative to the accomplishments of members of the Association or such other items of interest as

it deems necessary.

(F-4) Committee on Long Range Planning. It will be the duty of this Committee to select the time, location, and agenda of periodic study sessions for the Council and invited guests. These sessions are to be spent considering past, present, or future problems of the Southern Medical Association. Recommendations are to be given to the Coordinating Committee on Administration for approval and presentation to the Council.

SECTION 2. Standing Committees. There shall be ten Standing Committees to be known as the Committee on Scientific Work, Committee on Grants, Loans, and Scholarships, Committee on Publications and Advertising, Committee on Multi-Media Programs, Committee on Selections, Committee on Special Awards, Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, Committee on the Employees' Pension Plan and Personnel, Committee on History, and Committee on Long Range Planning. The duties of such Standing Committee are as set forth in Section 1 above. Each Standing Committee shall have from three to nine members who may be Councilors, Associate Councilors, or members of the Association, but shall not be members of the Executive Committee. The members of each Standing Committee and the Chairman of each Standing Committee shall be appointed annually by the Chairman of the Council. The members of each Standing Committee shall be appointed annually by the Chairman of the Council, but no person shall be eligible to serve more than six consecutive years as a committee member, except the Chairman. No person shall serve more than eight years as combined member and chairman. The Chairman of the Council is charged to provided continuity of these committees when making appointments. The President and Chairman of the Council shall be ex officio members of each Standing Committee. Each Standing Committee shall report in writing each year to the designated Coordinating Committee for such Standing Committee its activities and budget.

SECTION 3. Ad Hoc Committees. Ad Hoc Committees as deemed necessary or desirable by the President or Chairman of the Council, may be appointed annually by the President or the Chairman of the Council to undertake such activities or to discharge such duties as shall be designated for such Committee.

### **CHAPTER 4—SCIENTIFIC ACTIVITIES**

SECTION 1. Annual Meetings-General Sessions. During each annual meeting there shall be not less than two general sessions presided over by the President, unless he designates an alternate. One of these, which may be at a luncheon on the first or second day of the annual meeting, may be utilized as

a business meeting at which pertinent business affairs of the Association such as proposed amendments to the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS, may be presented. Another general session may be held at a time and place designated by the Executive Committee of the Council, at which time the order of business may include the President's address, the report of the Council including proposed amendments to the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS and the Council's report as Nominating Committee for the Association, the election of officers and installation of the new President, and the presentation of special awards.

SECTION 2. Annual Meetings-Scientific Section Sessions. The Scientific Sections of the Association shall hold such sessions as may be arranged by the Section Secretaries with the approval of the Committee on Scientific Work. All scientific activities, meetings, and exhibits at the annual meetings are available to physicians, members, and non-members of the Association, who are eligible for membership in their local and state medical societies. Residents, interns, medical students, technicians, and nurses are urged to attend. All persons attending must be properly registered before being admitted to the annual meeting. Except by special order, papers and discussions as set forth in the official program shall be followed from day to day until it has been completed, and all papers omitted will be recalled in regular order. No address or paper before the Association, or any of its Sections, except the address of the President, the official guest speakers of the Sections, and speakers on special programs, shall exceed fifteen minutes in presentation. The opening discussions shall be limited to five minutes and succeeding discussions shall not exceed three minutes each. No member or quest may discuss any paper more than one time. The closing discussion is not to exceed five minutes. An essayist, other than an official guest speaker, may not appear before the same Section two years consecutively, unless the second presentation is a continuation of the first, nor may any essayist, other than an official guest speaker, appear before more than one Section at an annual meeting. All papers read before the Association or any of its Sections shall become the property of the Association. Each paper shall be deposited with the Secretary of the Section when

New Sections may be created by vote of the Council after receiving petition from thirty active members of the Association representing that specialty or subspecialty and representing twelve of the states or District of Columbia in the Southern Medical Association territory. Recommendations to terminate or abolish a scientific Section may be made by the Council when that Section's participation, interest, and attendance has become ineffectual over a period of two years. A letter to this effect will be addressed to the current or most recent Chairman representing that Section to the effect that this recommendation has been made. If there is no response from that Section or if the response is considered inadequate, the Section involved may then be abolished or ter-minated by vote of the Council at the next annual meeting.

### CHAPTER 5-AWARDS

SECTION 1. Distinguished Service Award. There shall be a Distinguished Service Award of the Association which may be awarded annually to any member of the Association in recognition of outstanding contributions to the advancement of medical science and/or the Association. Any member of

the Association shall be eligible to receive the award and nominations may be made by any member of the Association

SECTION 2. Seale Harris Award. There shall be a Seale Harris Award which may be awarded annually to any member of the Association as recognition for important research accomplishment in the broad field of metabolism, endocrinology, nutrition, or for research which contributes to a better understanding of the chemical changes occuring in disease. Any member of the Association shall be eligible to receive the award and nominations may be made by any member of the Association.

SECTION 3. Original Research Award. There shall be an Original Research Award of the Association, consisting of a medal and a cash prize, which may be awarded annually in recognition of original research in clinical medicine or the basic science as applied to medicine. Any member of the Association shall be eligible to receive the award and nominations may be made by any member of the Association.

SECTION 4. Determination of Awards. These awards will be determined by a confidential Standing Committee appointed by the President to evaluate the contributions of the various candidates for special awards. The Committee shall submit the names of not more than three persons to the Council for each award. The Council may elect one for each respective award and presentation of awards will take place at the Second General Session of that annual meeting.

#### CHAPTER 6-DUES

SECTION 1. Annual Membership Dues. Effective July 1, 1984, the dues of this Association shall be \$75 per year, payable annually in advance, membership to begin on date of application. The life membership fee shall be actuarially computed and submitted to the Council for approval.

SECTION 2. Non-Payment of Dues. Any member whose dues shall remain unpaid for three months shall be automatically suspended at the end of the three months, provided that on a full payment of his arrearage he shall be automatically reinstated as a member in good standing from the date of suspension.

#### CHAPTER 7—SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION AUXILIARY

There shall be an Auxiliary to the Southern Medical Association which will function under the jurisdiction of the Council. The Executive Committee of the Council will be the Advisory Committee to the Auxiliary. Financial support to the Auxiliary may be granted at the discretion of the Council. The fiscal year will coincide with that of the Association. See BYLAWS, CHAPTER 8—Fiscal Year.

### CHAPTER 8-FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall be July 1 to June 30, but all salary provisions shall become effective December 1 of each year.

#### CHAPTER 9-RULES OF ORDER

The deliberations of this Association shall be governed by parliamentary usage as contained in the current edition of Roberts' "Rules of Order."

### CHAPTER 10—INDEMNIFICATION OF OFFICERS AND AGENTS OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Every person who is, or has been, a councilor, trustee, officer, employee or agent of the Association, or of a subsidiary or of an affiliate owned or controlled by the Association, shall be indemnified by the Association in a manner and to the extent authorized and permitted by the Alabama Nonprofit Corporation Act. The foregoing rights of indemnification shall be without prejudice to any other rights to which any such trustee, councilor, officer, employee or agent may be entitled as a matter of law.

### CHAPTER 11—AMENDMENTS

These BYLAWS may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members present and voting at a general session of that meeting after the amendment has been presented to the Executive Committee of the Council prior to that meeting.

### PURPOSE OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

The exclusive purpose of this unique organization is to develop and foster scientific medicine. Conceived as an organization which could, on a regular basis, promote the progress of scientific medicine generally and, in particular, attack problems peculiar to the South; established as a voluntary, nonprofit organization, and chartered under the laws of the State of Alabama, the Association is independent of other medical societies, but works closely with them.

Dedicated exclusively to serving the professional needs of physicians of the South, SMA strives to bring its members into closer touch and in more perfect harmony with each other, creating a society unique in its opportunity for fraternal relationships and in its personal significance.

Although the Association has grown from a membership of approximately 200 in 1906 to a membership of over 56,000 in 1989, its purpose remains the same and is so stated in its **CONSTITUTION** and **BYLAWS**, **ARTICLE II—PURPOSE**.

### ORGANIZATION AND EARLY HISTORY OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

The Southern Medical Association, like the sturdy oak, from a little acorn grew; but this was no ordinary acorn. Its embryo contained the elements of need, vision, and opportunity embodied in a previously existing organization known as the Tri-State Medical Association of Alabama, Georgia, and Tennessee, which was composed of some two hundred physicians.

Representatives of the Tri-State group, along with representatives from Florida, Louisiana, and Mississippi, met in Chattanooga, Tenn., on October 2, 1906, in response to an invitation from the President of the Tennessee State Medical Association. The invitational letter stated that the members of the Nashville Academy of Medicine felt that "there was a growing feeling among doctors of the southern group of states that a Southern Medical Association should be organized."

These representatives, most of whom were presidents of their state medical associations, adopted a resolution for presentation to the Tri-State Medical Association, stating among other reasons, that "a greater opportunity for self-improvement and achievement in the realm of scientific research is required by the progressive and cultured physicians of the district (the South) than is afforded by the state societies, and which, on account of its large membership, is denied them in the American Medical Association." The resolution, presented the next day (October 3, 1906), called for the merging of the Tri-State Medical Association into this larger body, thereby becoming the nucleus of the proposed Southern Medical Association.

Anticipating favorable action on the resolution, a Committee on Constitution and Bylaws was appointed on October 2, 1906, with instructions to have a tentative draft of the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS for the proposed Southern Medical Association ready to present to the Tri-State group the next day. Working all night, the Committee drafted a proposed CONSTITUTION calling for the formation of a voluntary, independent organization of physicians which would eventually embrace all of the sixteen Southern states and the District of Columbia. It further called for the Tri-State Medical Association to "thaw and resolve themselves into a dew; to die in order that the baby Southern Medical Association could be born."

In an atmosphere charged with emotion, the resolution and the tentative draft of the first CONSTITUTION were debated as the first order of business of the Tri-State group. There were impassioned pleas "on behalf of the young physicians of the Southern states for a wider field to engage our talents," as well as for "a stimulus, an incentive to spur us on to worthy deeds to more intensive

study, to greater accomplishments in the field of medicine and surgery." Jere L. Crook, M.D., Chairman, Committee on Constitution and Bylaws, tried to make the group visualize a great Southern Medical Association whose programs would deal with diseases peculiar to the Southern states and would present to the world the results of the research, the clinical experience, at the bedside and in the operating room, of the splendid body of men composing the ranks of the medical profession of the South.

Naturally, the fine record of the Tri-State group was ardently defended, citing loyalty and accomplishments of its members. But the arguments for greater opportunities for scientific improvement and for a wider fellowship among physicians triumphed. The founder of the Tri-State group, J. B. Cowan, M.D., Tullahoma, Tenn., who was Chief Surgeon on the staff of Lieutenant General Nathan Bedford Forrest, 1861-1865, understandably loathe to see his own brainchild die, and having pledged to fight any move to that effect, was so impressed with the "pleas of these ambitious young doctors for a chance to try their wings over all Dixie Land" that he moved the adoption of the resolution and the tentative CON-STITUTION and BYLAWS "without changing one jot or one tittle." The motion carried unanimously and thus the Southern Medical Association was born.

The work of organizing moved rapidly—a Nominating Committee was appointed, met promptly, and upon making its report, the first officers of the Southern Medical Association were elected and installed on October 3, 1906, at The Read House in Chattanooga, Tenn.

The first annual meeting was held in Birmingham, Ala., September 24-25, 1907, with a Scientific Assembly composed of three sections: Medicine, Surgery, and Ophthalmology. At this meeting H. H. Martin, M.D., Savannah, Ga., first President of the Association, summarized the general feeling of the members of the Southern Medical Association in regard to their new organization when, in closing his President's Address, he said:

"I wish to express my entire satisfaction with the unqualified success of this, our first annual meeting, and to publicly thank the various Section Officers for the most excellent program furnished for this meeting. I have never seen a better one in any medical association in this country. The Southern Medical Association is tonight an accomplished fact. Its future is in your hands to make of it what you will."

Thus began the growth and development of the Southern Medical Association.

### OFFICERS AND GOVERNING BODIES OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Just as the individual shares the responsibility of democratic government, so the individual member of the Southern Medical Association shares the responsibility of managing its affairs. But a pure democracy is an inefficient and cumbersome form of organization, and each of the members does not wish to study and vote on every single detail of the business of the Association. Therefore, provisions have been made whereby grants of power are distributed among officers and governing bodies.

### GRANTS OF POWER...

The membership has adopted a CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS (which it may abolish, change, or amend) which invests power in, and describes the duties of certain bodies and officers of the Association. In addition, the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS (1) states the purpose of the Association; (2) establishes requirements for and classes of membership; (3) provides for the scope and mechanics of meetings; (4) describes the manner of election, power, and duties of officers; (5) provides for the election or appointment of committees: (6) establishes and defines the administrative machinery; (7) prescribes dues and fiscal procedures, and (8) provides for amendments.

### OFFICERS...

The officers of the Association fall into two categories—the elected and the appointed officers. The group of elected officers, includes: (1) the General Officers: President, Fresident, Elect, and Vice-President; (2) the Trustees, and (3) the Section Officers. The group of appointed officers includes: (1) the Administrative Officers: Executive Vice-President and Editor; and (2) the Councilors and Associate Councilors. A complete outline of the duties of all officers, elected and appointed, is included in the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS.

### THE GOVERNING BODIES...

### THE COUNCIL

Through provisions in the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS, the membership established the Council as the governing body of the Association, and defined its composition, duties, and powers.

The Council consists of seventeen members; one representing members in each of the sixteen states and the District of Columbia which constitute the territory of the Association. Appointed by the President, a Councilor serves a five-year term, is not eligible for reappointment, unless he was appointed to fill an unexpired term, and is not eligible for elective office during his tenure as Councilor. The Council elects a Chairman and Vice-Chairman annually.

The Council meets as often and as long as necessary during the Annual Meetings, and it may be called into Interim session by the Chairman, or on petition of three Councilors. Much of the detail work of the Council is accomplished by efficient use of committees created for specific purposes. Through its Chairman, the Council makes a report of its findings, recommendations, and actions to the membership at the first general session of each annual meeting.

### THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE COUNCIL

The Executive Committee of the Council acts for the Council and the membership between Annual Meetings. This smaller body of nine is composed of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Council, who also serve as Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Council, the Immediate Past President, President, President-Elect, and Vice-President of the Association, and three (or four) additional councilors, appointed by the Chairman in rotation alphabetically by name one (or two) from each of the classes not represented by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman such that each Councilor shall serve at least one year on the Executive Committee.

The primary function of the Executive Committee of the Council is to consider all matters of business and report its findings and conclusions to the Council for action. Any matters of such urgency that they should not wait over until the Annual Meeting may be acted upon by the Executive Committee of the Council, however.

The Executive Committee of the Council meets as often and at such places as its Chairman or four of its members may decide except that one meeting each year must be held in Birmingham, Alabama.

### THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES


The Board of Trustees shall serve as the Auditing Committee to review the financial audit. They shall also submit an Annual Audit Report to the Executive Vice-President, Chairman of the Council, and President.

The Board of Trustees is composed of six members elected by the Council, one each year, to serve for a period of six years, with the oldest member in point of service serving as Chairman.

### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION...


By and large, the official governing bodies of the Association are policy-making groups. Decisions, programs, and policies established by the governing bodies are put into effect through (1) the administrative machinery of the Executive Vice-President and his staff at the headquarters office in Birmingham, Alabama, and (2) the Editor, Deputy Editor, and the Editorial Board.

### WHO CAN BELONG...

The membership of SMA is by invitation to physicians eligible for membership in the following state medical societies: Alabama, Arkansas, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, who are sponsored by the respective state Councilor, to invited medical officers of the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Public Health Service and Veterans Administration on active duty, and to invited members of the Puerto Rico Medical Association who are citizens of the United States of America.

The CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS of the Association provides for active membership as well as for various classes of associate and emeritus membership.

### DUES...

The modest dues of the Association, which includes the member's subscription to the SOUTH-ERN MEDICAL JOURNAL, keeps membership in this scientific organization well within the financial reach of all physicians. Effective July 1, 1984, the annual dues were set at \$75, payable in advance, with membership effective on the date of the application.

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### ACTIVITIES OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION I. THE ANNUAL MEETING

### GENERAL INFORMATION...

The Association's annual meeting is traditionally held in November each year in one of the cities located within the Association's territory. Dates for the Annual Meeting are selected at least 5 years in advance and conform to a Thursday-Sunday schedule. Dates and sites are subject to review and approval by the Council. All scientific activities, meetings, and exhibits at SMA annual meetings are open to physicians who are eligible for membership in their local and state medical societies whether or not they are members of the Southern Medical Association. Medical and nursing students, interns, residents, and paramedical personnel may also attend

Generally, the format of an annual meeting consists of two parts—the scientific program and the exhibits, both scientific and technical. Specifically, the scientific work of the Southern Medical Association is divided into twenty-four Sections, running the gamut from Allergy to Urology. Section work is augmented by general sessions, joint sessions, with two or more Sections cooperating to present programs of special interest, special symposia on timely subjects, meetings of conjoint societies, postgraduate courses, and scientific and technical exhibits, all designed for one purpose — to enhance the practice of medicine.

### SCIENTIFIC SECTIONS...

The modern concept of Section work was instituted by the Association at its first annual meeting in Birmingham, Ala., in 1907 when scientific programs were presented in three Sections: Medicine, Surgery, and Ophthalmology. Thus the basic reason for the founding of the Association in 1906—"to provide a greater opportunity for self-improvement and achievement..."

As specialization developed, the need for a forum for the discussion of problems and progress in these new fields developed also. The Southern Medical Association has been quick to sense these needs related to special interests and has created Sections for their benefit. The Association has often led the way in the recognition of certain specialties by being the first general medical organization to create Sections for these specialties. When interest in, and the need for more than a single session are demonstrated, and the specific needs cannot be incorporated into existing Section programs, a new Section is created for that special need. At the same time, when need for a Section no longer exists or when its work has been absorbed by other Sections, then such Sections are discontinued. This practice of being constantly alert to the needs and wishes of the physicians in the South has produced an everchanging list of the Association's Sections. The following list summarizes the Sections created by the Association in chronological order, with any changes from the original listed under the appropriate Section.

Each section elects its own officers—a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and Secretary-Elect, with primary responsibility for program planning resting with the Secretary. Duties of all officers are outlined in the CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS. Section pro-

grams are coordinated in the winter at the annual Section Secretaries' Conference which is attended by the members of the Association's Committee on Scientific Activities in addition to the Section Secretaries. Every effort is made to see that well-rounded scientific programs are planned for each Section.

A physician attending a Southern Medical Association meeting is not required to attend only one Section. He may spend time where, in his opinion, it will be most beneficial to him. This freedom to choose provides great program flexibility, variety and personal appeal. At the same time this plan enables the Southern Medical Association to reach one of its continuing goals—helping doctors practice better medicine.

### SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL EXHIBITS...

In addition to the scientific sessions and postgraduate courses offered physicians attending the annual meeting, there are hundreds of scientific and technical exhibits on display. The scientific exhibits present results of research, experimentation, and studies in the field of medicine. Technical exhibits offer the busy physician the opportunity to view the latest drugs, medical equipment, and services on the market. These exhibits are carefully screened by Committees and represent the highest standards in quality, originality, and educational value. Awards are made for the most outstanding scientific and technical exhibits.

### THE SOCIAL SIDE ...

The annual meeting, while geared primarily for education, also has its moments of relaxation. Thriving on an informal atmosphere—where physicians from every type of practice can meet to exchange ideas—SMA has a widely known reputation for its "Southern Hospitality." Social highlights of the anual meeting include: alumni reunions, Section social events, annual golf tournament, tennis tournament, fun run, President's Reception, Luncheon, and Dinner Dance, activities for the spouses planned by the Southern Medical Association Auxiliary, and, of course, fellowship with members of the medical profession from all parts of the United States and many foreign countries.

### II. POSTGRADUATE CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

The Southern Medical Association is committed to expanding and diversifying its educational opportunities to provide a more comprehensive network of continuing medical education activities. On-site seminars and regional postgraduate conferences are conducted annually. These two major projects, coupled with the Multi-Media Programs, provide a comprehensive and coordinated continuing medical education network of high quality programs at very reasonable prices.

### **MULTI-MEDIA PROGRAMS...**

#### DIAL ACCESS

Dial Access is SMA's highly acclaimed, unique telephone access to audiotaped continuing medical educational programs for physicians. Over 17,000 physicians, both members and nonmembers of the Association, subscribe to the service. The subscription price is \$5 annually for members of the Association and \$25 annually for nonmembers. Two new Sections, Geriatrics, and Critical Care/Emergency Medicine, were added in 1989 to the nine already on line: Allergy and Immunology, Arthritis and Rheumatism, Diabetes and Endocrinology, Gastroenterology, Infectious Diseases, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Psychotherapeutics, Cardiovascular Diseases and Cancer.

The Southern Medical Association continuously updates audio programs to assure that the tapes contain the most current diagnostic and therapeutic information available for the practicing physician. They are approved for hour-for-hour credit in Category 2 of AMA's Physician Recognition Award and AAFP's prescribed credit. All credits earned are recorded on SMA's computer and a certificate of earnings is provided at the end of each calendar year.

### **VIDEO ACCESS**

Video Access is SMA's series of videotapes providing both physician and patient education at an affordable price. Programs include tapes on vasectomy, adolescent alcoholism and videolaseroscopy.

### **AUDIO ACCESS**

Representative *Dial Access* programs are recorded on audiocassettes and are made available for purchase. These programs are also approved for hour-for-hour credit in Category 2 of AMA's Physician's Recognition Award and AAFP's Prescribed credit.

#### CLINICAL CONCEPTS

Clinical Concepts are home-study courses in booklet form compiled from the *Dial Access* monographs. Each course presents 10 to 12 monographs on a specific subject, objectives, and CME questions. Courses are available on diabetes, mellitus, thyroid gland, rheumatoid arthritis, antimicrobial agents, hepatitis, peptic ulcers, and diarrheal diseases. SMA designates each course for 2 credit hours of Category 1 of AMA's Physician's Recognition Award.

Southern Medical Association's educational opportunities offer physicians precise and timely medical information presented by healthcare experts, delivered in a variety of formats and locations. ### III. PUBLICATIONS

### THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL...

### **BRIEF HISTORY**

During the first years of its history, the Association did not actually own a journal. Various publications were named "official organ of publication" from time

At the annual meeting held in Atlanta, Ga., November 10-12, 1908, arrangements were made for the MEDICAL REPORT OF SHREVEPORT, Shreveport, La., to serve as the official organ of publication, name to be changed to JOURNAL OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION, effective January 1909 (Vol. 2, No.1). Oscar Dowling, M.D., Shreveport, La., Secretary-Treasurer of the Southern Medical Association, was Editor. It was discontinued as JOURNAL OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION as of December 1909.

The GULF STATES JOURNAL OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY, Mobile, Ala., formerly the MOBILE MEDICAL AND SURGICAL JOURNAL, became the Association's official organ of of publication with January 1910 (Vol. 16, No. 1). Owners Seale Harris, M.D., and H. A. Moody, M.D., both of Mobile, Ala., served as Editors.

The SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL, a publication privately owned by a group of Nashville, Tenn., physicians, began in Nashville, Tenn., July 1908 (Vol. , No. 1). It was purchased in October or November 1910 by Seale Harris, M.D., Mobile, Ala., as principal owner with some other physicians having minor financial interest. Thus, the owners of the GULF STATES JOURNAL OF MEDICINE AND SURGERY merged this publication (Vol. 17, No. 5) with their newly acquired publication, the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL with the December 1910 issue (Vol. 3, No. 11). Also, beginning with the December 1910 issue, the new SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOUR-NAL carried the additional designation of JOURNAL OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION. Seale Harris, M.D., Mobile, Ala., served as Editor until November 1921, and H. A. Moody, M.D., Mobile, Ala., served as Managing Editor until April 1916.

From December 1910 to May 1916, J. A. Witherspoon, M.D., W. D. Haggard, M.D., William Litterer, M.D., W. A. Bryan, M.D., and M. M. Cullon, M.D., all of Nashville, Tenn., and Oscar Dowling, M.D., Shreveport, La., were Associate Editors.

From June 1916 to October 1917, M. Y. Dabney, M.D., became Managing Editor and James R. Garber, M.D., Birmingham, Ala., became Associate Editor. From December 1917 to December 1919, Dr. Dabney served as Acting Editor while Dr. Harris was on active military duty. From January 1920 to November 1921, both Dr. Dabney and Dr. Garber were designated Associate Editors.

In November 1921 the Southern Medical Association, with a membership of 6,328, purchased the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL from Dr. Harris and his co-owners and elected Dr. Dabney, Editor. Dr. Harris resigned as Editor at that meeting. Dr. Dabney served as Editor from December 1921 to December 1954 and his wife, Eugenia B. Dabney, served as Assistant Editor, 1930-1935, and Associate Editor from 1935 until December 1954.

Curtice Rosser, M.D., Dallas, Tex., and Tinsley R. Harrison, M.D., Birmingham, Ala., were Associate Editors from January 1951 to December 1954. Curtice J. Lund, M.D., New Orleans, La., served as an Associate Editor from January 1951 to December 1952. Howard L. Holley, M.D., Birmingham, Ala., served as an Associate Editor from January 1954 to December 1954.

R. H. Kampmeier, M.D., Nashville, Tenn., became Editor and Mr. V. O. Foster, Birmingham, Ala., Managing Editor, effective December 1, 1954. Mr. Robert F. Butts, Birmingham, Ala., became Managing Editor, December 1, 1960. Harris D. Riley, Jr., Oklahoma City, Okla., became Associate Editor of the JOURNAL in January 1971, and assumed the role of Editor in January 1973, upon Dr. Kampmeier's retirement. Dr. Kampmeier was retained as Advisory Editor. In September 1977, John B. Thomison, M.D., of Nashville, Tenn., was appointed Editor succeeding Dr. Rilev.

With sound business and editorial management. the JOURNAL has not only grown in size and financial stability, but it has also grown in scientific stature and influence. Its cumulative contribution to the medical literature parallels and mirrors the growth and scientific development of medicine in the South.

### THE JOURNAL TODAY

Throughout its entire life, the SOUTHERN MEDI-CAL JOURNAL has adhered to its main objective announced in the first issue: to help doctors practice better medicine by bringing to them high quality, original articles by leading medical researchers and specialists, and general information of concern to the medical profession.

The SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL is a general medical publication which presents monthly some 35 major articles, many profusely illustrated with photographs and drawings. Its contents are as broadly based as the practice of medicine and surgery. Articles are chosen from hundreds submitted and from the 300 or so papers presented at the annual scientific sessions by leaders in the various specialized fields of medicine.

Offices of the JOURNAL are in the headquarters building of the Southern Medical Association in Birmingham, Ala. The Editor, John B. Thomison, M.D., is a practicing pathologist in Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Thomison began his editorship in September 1977 succeeding Harris D. Riley, Jr., M.D.

Assisting the Editor are R. H. Kampmeier, M.D., as Editor Emeritus, the Editorial Board, established by Dr. Kampmeier, January 1954, which usually consists of 14 members who are appointed by the Editor for five-year terms; and the Advisory Committee to the Editorial Board which is composed of the Secretaries of the Sections of the Southern Medical Association.

Today the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL goes into the 16 Southern states and the District of Columbia which comprise the Association's membership territory, as well as all other states, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, the Canal Zone, and 22 European and Asiatic countries. One of the most influential medical publications in the world, the JOUR-NAL brings to the practicing physician knowledge

which will enable him to provide the best possible care for patients in this age of rapidly changing modern medicine.

### THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN

When the Association was only three years old at the New Orleans Meeting, November 9-11, 1909 the Council recommended the publication of a quarterly bulletin. On November 1, 1912, the SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN, Volume 1, Number 1 was issued. It included the program for the forthcoming Annual Meeting and other information about the Association. The Council approved this bulletin, authorized its continuance, and the SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN has been published quarterly since 1912.

At the Miami Beach Meeting in 1957 a proposal to expand the quarterly SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN to a monthly publication was reviewed and approved by the Council. The first step of the proposed expansion was taken when the new format of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN was introduced with the March 1961 issue with R. H. Kampmeier, M.D., Nashville, Tenn., Editor, The BULLETIN was accepted overwhelmingly by the Southern physicians.

The purpose of the BULLETIN was to provide interesting and up-to-date scientific and non-scientific information for virtually all of the practicing physicians in the Association's membership territory, and to stimulate interest in the Association

and its various activities.

Each issue was designed to be of reference value covering various subjects of interest such as current VD problems, cancer, rehabilitation, alcoholism

and habituating drugs, family planning, roadside injuries, and the impact of the federal government upon medical care. From 1912 through 1968, the September issue of the BULLETIN contained the preliminary program for the Annual Meeting. The second step in expanding the BULLETIN came in 1969 when all four of the quarterly issues followed the basic format, but with increased size, and the preliminary program for the Annual Meeting was published separately. During 1970 the BULLETIN increased to six issues, one every other month.

In January 1972, the name of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL BULLETIN was changed to SOUTHERN

MEDICINE

Addison B. Scoville, Jr., M.D., Nashville, Tenn. was appointed as Assistant Editor of SOUTHERN

MEDICINE in June 1976.

After a great deal of thought and intensive costs analysis it was decided on February 11, 1978 to terminate publication of SOUTHERN MEDICINE in its

existing form.

Today, SOUTHERN MEDICINE provides important information concerning SMA's educational programs and services for its members, including details for upcoming seminars, workshops, postgraduate courses, and the annual meeting, as well as information on Dial Access, Video Access, and Audio Access offerings. SOUTHERN MEDICINE also provides up-to-date information on the benefits and services offered through the Association, including its Fringe Benefits Program, Physicians' Purchasing Program, SMA Travel Services, and Typography & Design.
In addition, SOUTHERN MEDICINE also regular-

ly features articles concerning socio-economic and other issues of importance to the physician and his practice, as well as spotlights on various members of the Association and regular messages from its

leading officers.

### IV. MEDICAL STUDENTS' PROGRAM

The Medical Students' Program was inaugurated because the Council of the Southern Medical Association wanted to demonstrate, by specific action, the enormous interest the Association had in medical education. It was estimated that the majority of physicians practice medicine nearly ten years before attending regional or national medical meetings or any kind of refresher course. The Association's Council took action at the Houston Meeting in 1955 by appointing a Committee on Medical Student Representatives to study the advisability of inviting representatives from the senior classes of medical schools within the territory of the Association to the Association's annual meetings. The Committee recommended this program as a step toward eliminating the time-gap from graduation to postgraduate studies.

The first student guests of the Association, representing approximately one-third of the medical schools located within the Association's territory, came to the Washington Meeting in 1956. The program was continued by inviting one-third of the schools each year until at the Atlanta Meeting in 1959, the cycle was completed. Since this program had become immensely popular, with full approval and cooperation of the deans, the Council voted unanimously at the Atlanta Meeting to make this project an official part of each Annual Meeting. At the Dallas Meeting in 1961, it was decided by the Council that the program should be expanded by inviting two-thirds of the schools to participate in 1962 and all schools in the Association's territory to participate in 1963. The Executive Committee of the Council further expanded this program in January 1968 by

recommending that each school in the Association's territory be invited to send not only a senior class representative, but a representative from the junior class as well.

The Executive Committee of the Council decided in February 1971, that beginning with the Miami Beach Meeting, 1971, the Association invite only a representative from the junior class.

Special sessions are planned for the representatives during each Annual Meeting and the students are special guests of the President at the President's Reception, Luncheon, and Dinner Dance. In addition to the special sessions planned for the students, they are invited to attend and participate in all scientific activities of an Annual Meeting.

The objectives of this program are: (1) to give students an opportunity to participate in a full-scale medical meeting; (2) to teach students that study does not cease when classrooms are left and point out the value of continuing medical education after graduation; (3) to make students aware that medical organizations are engaged in a continuous effort to promote research and present results to practicing physicians, and that through the scientific sessions "postgraduate" courses in medicine are offered, and (4) to urge the students to share their findings with their classmates upon returning to school.

At the Annual Meeting in November 1979, the

At the Annual Meeting in November 1979, the Medical Students' Program was discontinued. It was determined by the Executive Committee that this program should be redesigned, so that it would focus on membership at several different levels, medical students, residents, physicians entering practice, and practicing physicians.

### V. RESIDENCY TRAINING LOAN FUND

### **ORIGINALLY** A GRANT PROGRAM...

Recognizing the increasing need of financial assistance for those physicians who had completed their formal education, but who are seeking additional education in the form of residency training and fellowships, the Southern Medical Association established the Southern Medical Association Residency Training Grant Fund at the Miami Beach Meeting. November 1962. This project of the Association provided funds to allow a physician to complete a chosen number of years of training without adding to his previous indebtedness and still receive an income, which, while not necessarily commensurate with his education and value, would allow him a comfortable existence during this training period. The first four grants under this program were awarded in 1963 for the residency year 1963-1964. Five grants were awarded in July 1964; seven, July 1965; ten, July 1966; eleven, July 1967; fourteen, July 1968.

The Grant Fund was established so that recipients. as well as other members of the Association, could make tax-deductible donations to the Fund thereby increasing the number of residents who could be assisted. While recipients of a grant assumed no legal obligation to repay, it was hoped all would assume a moral obligation to do so.

### THEN A LOAN PROGRAM...

At the New Orleans Meeting, November 1968, the Council voted to change the existing Residency Training Grant Fund to the Residency Training Loan Fund and the Association's CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS were amended by changing the committee's name to the Committee on Grants and Loans. The amount available for loans for the year July 1969-July 1970 was \$30,000.

### THEN A GRANT AND LOAN PROGRAM...

In order to provide assistance to those in financial need as well as give recognition to exceptional individuals, greater flexibility was needed in the program. Therefore, the Council voted at the Atlanta Meeting, November 1969, to give the Committee on Grants and Loans full authority to determine the needs and merits of each applicant and decide if a grant should be awarded or if a loan should be approved. The total amount of funds available for grants and loans for the year July 1, 1977-June 30, 1978 was \$40,000 (\$10,000, grants; \$30,000, loans).

### NOW A LOAN PROGRAM...

At its Midwinter Meeting in Birmingham, Alabama, February 13, 1977, the SMA Executive Committee of the Council voted to discontinue giving grants under this program and made it strictly a loan program.

In November 1988 the Council voted to increase the amount available for Residency Training Loans and Research Project Grants to \$150,000 (from the previous amount of \$100,000) to become effective July 1, 1989.

### RULES GOVERNING THE LOAN PROGRAM...

- (1) Eligibility Requirements . . . In order to be eligible to apply for a loan from this Fund, an applicant must satisfy the following requirements:
  - (a) be a citizen of the United States of America;
  - (b) be a graduate of an accredited medical school who is entering a clinical training program;
  - (c) have completed one year of post medical training prior to receipt of first loan payment (application may be made, however, during final portion of internship);
  - (d) be engaged (or accepted) in residency training in an approved hospital in the territory of the Southern Medical Association;
  - (e) shall be required to have the Head of Department or the Director of Residency Program to submit a letter outlining the applicant's need.

Persons serving in the armed services are ineligible.

- (2) Selection of Recipients... The criteria for the selection of loan recipients shall be based on need and potential. Selection shall be made by the Committee on Grants, Loans, and Scholarships prior to July 1.
- (3) Amount of Loan ... The loan shall be primarily for personal use with the exact amount determined by individual need. The maximum loan available to one applicant shall be \$2,400, payable at the rate of \$200 per month for twelve months, beginning annually on July 1. A recipient may apply for additional loans.
- (4) Application for Loan...Official application forms may be secured from the Southern Medical Association, 35 Lakeshore Drive, P.O. Box 190088, Birmingham, Alabama 35219-0088. Applicants shall be required to submit to the headquarters office by April 1:
  - (a) a completed official application form;
  - (b) a curriculum vitae;
  - (c) a personal biographical sketch of one or two paragraphs, not to exceed one page;
  - (d) a copy of IRS Form 1040;
  - (e) letter from Head of Department or Director of Residency Program where applicant is currently enrolled or has been accepted outlining applicant's need;
  - (f) interview letter from Councilor or his designee:
  - (g) letter to validate applicant's medical school graduation, date and standing;
  - (h) sign release form, return immediately to SMA

to be mailed to Financial Assistance Office at medical school of record, with our letter requesting an indication of applicant's financial history;

(i) a typed summary of any other pertinent information concerning your own earnings or other financial assets or obligations, in addition to the information requested on Pages 3 and 4, that would be helpful to the Committee in assessing your financial need for this loan.

Further, it is applicant's responsibility to arrange

for all requirements to be met.

(5) Interest Rate on Loans... No interest shall be charged on loans made from this Fund until the beginning of the second year after the completion

of recipient's residency training or at the end of the sixth year after recipient's graduation from medical college, whichever comes first. The interest rate charged shall be seven percent per annum or the current interest rate charge for FHA loans, whichever is less.

- (6) Requirements for Loan Recipients...Loan recipients shall be required to:
  - (a) Apply for Associate Membership in the Southern Medical Association
  - (b) Sign properly executed promissory note to be filed at the SMA headquarters office.
  - (c) Submit a progress report of the year's activities at the end of the loan year.

### VI. RESEARCH PROJECT FUND

Members of the Committee on Grants and Loans observed that funds for initiating small research projects were not readily available in most medical centers or training areas. Therefore, at the Atlanta Meeting, November 1969, the Council established the SMA Research Project Fund. This Fund originally consisted of \$6,000 annually from which grants could be made to those participating in investigative projects. Due to the large number of applications received for grants from this Fund during the first year of operation, the Committee on Grants and Loans recommended to the Council at the Dallas Meeting, November 1970, that the amount of grants be increased to \$20,000 annually (July 1-June 30). This Fund is under the direction of the Committee on Grants and Loans.

At the New Orleans Meeting in November 1976, the Committee on Grants and Loans recommended that the amount for grants be increased to \$40,000 annually. In 1982 the Committee on Grants and Loans approved a grant increase in the amount of \$20,000, making the total amount available \$60,000.

In November, 1988 the Council of the SMA voted to increase the combined amount available for Research Grants and Residency Training Loans to \$150,000 from the previous amount of \$100,000. This would become effective July 1, 1989.

### RULES GOVERNING THE RESEARCH PROJECT FUND...

- (1) Amount Available ...
  - (a) The headquarters office shall be responsible for notifying the Deans and Heads of Departments at the medical schools located in SMA's territory that limited funds are available for those participating in investigative projects.
  - (b) Money in the Research Project Fund will be

- available primarily to physicians in house staff training (Graduate Medical Education) and Medical Students rather than to established faculty investigators.
- (c) Depending on the availability of funds, a maximum of two grants of \$2,500 each may be awarded from this Fund, per school, per year.

### (2) Purpose...

- (a) A grant from this Fund shall be primarily for the purpose of starting a new project, or for the continuation of a relatively new project.
- (b) A grant from this Fund shall be used for the purchase of expendable items only. This includes the purchase and maintenance of animals.

### (3) Application...

- (a) Official application forms may be secured by writing the Executive Vice-President, Southern Medical Association, 35 Lakeshore Drive, P. O. Box 190088, Birmingham, Ala. 35219, Deadline for receiving applications is April 1.
- (4) If Approved...When a grant is awarded, the Southern Medical Association shall issue a check jointly to the applicant and the institution with which he is connected. The check shall be mailed to the applicant.
- (5) Requirements...Faculty/Clinical Advisor is required to: Submit a letter outlining the potential clinical applications of the project. Recipients of grants from this Fund shall be required to:
  - (a) apply for membership in Southern Medical Association; and
  - (b) Recipient and Faculty/Clinical Advisor are required to send Southern Medical Association a summary of the results of the research project upon its completion.

### VII. MEDICAL STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Recognizing the need for providing assistance to first-year medical students, particularly those of superior abilities, the Council established the Southern Medical Association Medical Student Scholarship Fund at the Atlanta Meeting, November 1969. Effective 1989, this fund allows three \$500 scholarships per medical school located within the territory of the Southern Medical Association and is under the direction of the Standing Committee on Grants, Loans and Scholarships.

### RULES GOVERNING THE MEDICAL STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP FUND...

### (1) Amount Available . . .

- (a) The headquarters office shall be responsible for notifying the Deans of all medical schools located in SMA's territory that limited funds are available for scholarships for first-year medical students.
- (b) There are three \$500 scholarships available from this Fund, per school per year (September 1-August 31).

(2) Purpose ...

A scholarship from this Fund shall be for the purpose of giving aid in providing tuition to a first-year student of superior ability who is in need of scholarship funds.

(3) Application...

- (a) Application for a scholarship from this Fund must be made by the Dean on behalf of his students, by writing to the Executive Vice-President, Southern Medical Association, 35 Lakeshore Drive, P.O. Box 190088, Birmingham, Ala. 35219.
- (b) The letter should give:
  - full name and mailing address of the students;
  - (2) explanation of students' needs;
  - (3) deserving qualities of the students for scholarships.

(4) If Approved...

When scholarship is awarded, the headquarters office shall notify the Dean, and shall issue a check jointly to the applicant and the school and send it directly to the medical school.

### VIII. SOUTHERN MEDICAL RESEARCH AND EDUCATION FOUNDATION

In 1986 SMA established an Educational Endowment Fund from which earnings are used to provide the scholarships, research projects and other programs supporting the educational purposes of the Association. The Association's five-year goal is to obtain \$1.5 million in endowment principal. Based on an estimated interest rate of 10%, this fund would provide \$150,000 annually to be used to fund scholarships and research grants administered by Southern Medical Association. In December 1987, SMA launched a Planned Giving Program incorporating the existing Endowment Fund with several other options for charitable giving. Donors may target gifts for scholarships, lectureships or special educational programs through gifts from various means including bequests, life insurance, real estate or securities. With any gift, donors may establish memorials for deceased loved ones or recognition for a colleague.

In November, 1988, Southern Medical Research and Education Foundation was established at the charter meeting of the SMA Ad Hoc Funds Development Committee.

Purposes of the Foundation will be to provide an investment in the future of medical and health care delivery, to stimulate interest in conducting research, to provide financial aid to deserving medical students, and to recognize or memorialize donors and their designees.

Each year Southern Medical Association's Committee on Grants, Loans and Scholarships has distributed approximately two scholarships to each of 49 eligible medical schools in SMA territory. Beginning in 1989 there were three \$500 scholarships made available to each of these schools. In 1989, the SMA awarded \$61,545 in Research Project Grants to 28 of the 58 applicants received that year.

### IX AWARDS

The Southern Medical Association has created from time to time awards so that the Association might honor worthy members. Presently there are three official awards of the Association; the Distinguished Service Award; the Seale Harris Award; and the Original Research Award. Nomination and application forms, which may be obtained from the headquarters office, must be received at the

headquarters office by August 1.
All nominations and applications are considered by the Committee on Special Awards. This confidential Committee, consisting of five members with the Vice-President as Chairman, is appointed by the President to evaluate the contributions of the various candidates for special awards. If suitable candidates are selected by the Committee, it submits the names of not more than three such members to the Council for each award. The Council may then select one for each respective award and presentation of the awards takes place at the last general session of an Annual Meeting.

### THE RESEARCH MEDAL...

During the 1912 Annual Meeting in Jacksonville. Fla., the Association established the Research Medal which could be awarded from time to time to a member of the Association for meritorious and original research work provided the member had made contributions to medical science of sufficient importance to merit this distinction.

In 1961 both the Research Medal and the Original Research Award existed. Then in 1962 the Research Medal as established in 1912 was discontinued in favor of the Original Research Award.

### THE SCIENTIFIC EXHIBIT AWARDS...

Scientific exhibits became an official part of the annual meeting at the Louisville Meeting in 1920. The Council established a Committee on Scientific Exhibit Awards and Certificates were given for: Best Exhibit by an individual Physician; Best Exhibit by a Medical School; Best General Exhibit. In 1924 the Council voted to change the award designation to: First Award; Second Award; Third Award; and Honorable Mention Award(s) at the discretion of the Committee. In 1984, six place awards were offered, and Honorable Mention was changed to Certificate

The Committee of Scientific Exhibits and Awards is a subcommittee of the Standing Committee on Scientific Work.

The following standards are used by the Committee in making the awards; originality, practicability, applicability to practice of medicine, quality, teaching value, quantity, and personal demonstration.

A plaque, certificate and ribbon are awarded for first place, and certificates and ribbons are awarded for 2nd thru 6th places. Certificates of Merit are awarded for those exhibits warranting such recognition.

### X. SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION AUXILIARY

During the Southern Medical Association Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., November, 1923, Mrs. Seale Harris of Birmingham, Alabama, was chosen to organize an Auxiliary for this group. The proposed Auxiliary was organized the following year during the SMA Annual Meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana. There were 88 charter members from 16 states and the District of Columbia. Today, there are more than 38,000 Auxilians and that number continues to grow.

Spouses of members of the Southern Medical Association are automatically members of the SMA Auxiliary and there are no membership dues. Membership is limited to spouses of physicians who are members of SMA and widows/widowers of deceased members who were in good standing at the time of death.

Through the year, the SMA Auxiliary participates in several interesting projects, including the promotion of Doctors' Day and the encouragement of participation in Medical Heritage (Research and Romance) projects. The Auxiliary also maintains a close relationship with the state medical auxiliaries in each of its member states and aids in the promotion of membership in the Association.

The Southern Medical Association Auxiliary has made an organized effort to develop meaningful programs for the spouses of SMA members. Several im-

portant new developments have occurred during the past few years which have laid the groundwork for strong and effective programming for future years.

To improve communications, the SMA Auxiliary publishes a newsletter entitled SOUTHERN CONNECTION. This newsletter serves as a vehicle for presenting information, programs, and services available to Auxiliary members from the Southern Medical Association. It also helps to inform Auxiliary members around the region of activities of interest underway for various Auxiliary members.

Realizing that to become a strong and effective leader, one must be knowledgeable about the Association, the Auxiliary initiated the Annual Leadership Conference to teach its leadership about the many programs, accomplishments, and goals of the SMA. This Conference has been successful in its belief that in knowledge there is strength.

The Auxiliary also develops and coordinates a comprehensive program presented during the SMA Annual Meeting which includes a variety of leadership meetings, seminars and tours.

The Southern Medical Association Auxiliary continues to grow in strength and in dedication, always striving to build a stronger and more effective organization.

### ACTIVITIES OF SMA SERVICES, INC. I. GROUP INSURANCE PROGRAM

The Southern Medical Association Insurance Program was established in 1952 when a Disability Insurance Plan was approved by the Council. Since that time, the program has expanded to include eight basic insurance plans, each designed to meet the specific needs of physicians, their families and employees.

The Association's Committee on Insurance, alert to the needs and wishes of the members of the Association, has continuously updated the various Plans in an effort to provide the most coverage for the premium dollar and, ultimately, the best group insurance program available to the medical profession.

### WHO IS ELIGIBLE?...

- SMA members and associate members (all coverages)
- Spouses of SMA members and dependent children up to 19 years of age. Coverage is extended for dependent children to age 30 if they are continuous full-time students.
- Employees of SMA members (Life, Accidental Death and Dismemberment, and Major Medical only)

### PLANS INCLUDED IN THE SMA GROUP INSURANCE PROGRAM...

- LIFE INSURANCE (Up to \$1,000,000)
   Payable in event of death due to any cause.
   Twenty benefit plans from which to choose.
   Dependent coverage available. (Spouse up to \$1,00,000 and Children up to \$7,500).
- \$100,000 and Children up to \$7,500).

  2. ACCIDENTAL DEATH AND DISMEMBER-MENT (Up to \$150,000) Full amount payable in addition to Life Insurance in the event of accidental death; proportional amounts payable for dismemberment. Three plans from which to choose. Spouse benefits also available.
- LONG-TERM DISABILITY INCOME (Up to \$8,000 per month) Guaranteed monthly income in the event of long term disability. If member and spouse are killed in the same accident, benefits will continue until the youngest child reaches age 19, or to age 30 if a full-time student.

Double daily benefits are payable for hospitalization for cancer, intensive care, or coronary care treatment for one full day or more, before age 65. Benefits are payable directly to the insured.

   Breaks the tradition of fixed premiums and fixed benefit insurance. Policyholders can vary premium payments and type of coverage desired. Interest and cash value buildup is tax deferred.

### II. PHYSICIANS' RETIREMENT PROGRAM

The Southern Medical Association adopted a Physicians' Retirement Program at the annual meeting in Atlanta in November, 1974. Marketing of the Retirement Program was initiated in January, 1975. In 1982, an IRA was added.

The Council established a Committee on Physicians' Retirement at the New Orleans Meeting in

November, 1981.

In April of 1986, after nearly a year of investigation and evaluation, the Council of the Southern Medical Association approved the selection of Connecticut General Life Insurance Company to manage program assets and provide the funding vehicles to be made available to the Southern Medical Association membership who participate in the Retirement Program. Presently the retirement and IRA funds have approximately \$127 million in assets.

Actively Managed Fixed Income Account— Invested primarily in U.S. Government Securities.

Intermediate Fixed Income Account—Invested in intermediate term bonds and private placements.

International Equity—Seeks worldwide diversification.

INDIVIDUAL RETIREMENT ANNUITY (IRA)
 The Southern Medical Association's IRA program became effective in February of 1982.

Shortly after the passage of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 (TRA 86), a brief survey of our membership indicated a continued strong interest in the SMA-IRA. In view of this expression of interest and need, the Southern Medical Association plans to continue an active offering of the IRA program for its members, spouses, and their employees. At present, in excess of \$54 million has been deposited into the IRA fund.

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# HEADQUARTERS OFFICE AND STAFF OF THE SOUTHERN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

#### ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS

Records were maintained by the physicians elected to the offices of Secretary, Treasurer, or Secretary and Treasurer, until November 1910 when Seale Harris, M.D., Mobile, Ala., was elected Secretary and Treasurer. Dr. Harris maintained the offices of the Association in Mobile, Ala., from November 1910 until July 1915 when he moved to Birmingham, Ala., and relocated the Association's offices in the Empire Building. Dr. Harris served as Secretary and Treasurer, as well as Editor, until his retirement in 1921. While Dr. Harris was on military duty, November 1917-November 1919, James R. Garber, M.D., Birmingham, Ala., filled in as acting Secretary.

When Dr. Harris retired in 1921, Mr. C. P. Loranz, Birmingham, Ala., was named to the position of Secretary-Treasurer, and Business Manager, a job he filled until November 1928. Mr. Loranz had worked for Dr. Harris since 1912 as Business Manager of the SOUTHERN MEDICAL JOURNAL, which was then privately owned by Dr. Harris. Mr. Loranz was designated Assistant Treasurer of the Association in November 1914 and Business Manager of the Association in November 1916, Mr. Loranz' title was altered to Secretary, Treasurer, and General Manager in November 1928, and under the all-inclusive title of Secretary-Manager, he served until December 1, 1954. During Mr. Loranz' leave of absence due to illness, Emmett B. Carmichael, Ph.D., Birmingham, Ala., was appointed Acting Secretary-Manager from July 16, 1948, to October 31, 1948. Dr. Carmichael in turn appointed Mr. Robert F. Butts, who had been Assistant to Mr. Loranz since 1948, as Assistant Secretary-Manager.

Mr. V. O. Foster, Birmingham, Ala., took over the executive duties of the Association with the new title of Executive Secretary and Treasurer, with a five-year contract on December 1, 1954. However, the Council, wishing to continue utilizing the vast experiences of Mr. Loranz, voted to retain Mr. Loranz, after his retirement December 1, 1954, as Advisor and Professional Relations Counselor for a period of three years. This arrangement was renewed for a second three-year period ending December 1, 1957. Mr. Butts, who had served as Assistant to the Secretary-Manager, 1948-1950, and Assistant Secretary-Manager, 1950-1954, was elected Business Manager with a five-year contract beginning December 1, 1954.

In September 1959 Mr. Foster became ill before fulfilling his contract. Mr. Butts was asked to serve as Acting Executive Secretary and Treasurer until further notice in addition to continuing as Business Manager.

Due to his mature years and impaired health, the Council, at the Atlanta Meeting, November 1959, relieved Mr. Loranz of his assignment (which would not have expired until December 1, 1960) as Advisor and Professional Relations Counselor and bestowed upon him the permanent title of Advisor and Special Consultant. The Council extended Mr. Foster's contract as Executive Secretary and Treasurer for one year, December 1, 1959 to December 1, 1960, and named Mr. Butts as Associate Executive Secretary and Treasurer for one year, December 1, 1950, and extended him a new five-year contract as Business Manager, December 1, 1959 to December 1, 1964. (This contract was later extended

by one year so that all Mr. Butts' contracts would have the same expiration date.)

In January 1960, the Executive Committee of the Council took the following actions regarding the Association's executive personnel: (1) Mr. Butts' one-year contract as Associate Executive Secretary and Treasurer was cancelled, and he was named Professional Relations Counselor, a position he held from February 1, 1960, to July 1, 1960, when he retired.

At the Dallas Meeting, November 1961, Mr. Butts was given the title of Executive Director, which would include his present titles of Executive Secretary and Treasurer, Business Manager, and Managing Editor.

Following a Constitutional change in November 1977, Mr. Butts assumed the title of Executive Vice-President. The Bylaws were changed during the New Orleans Meeting in November 1976 to reflect this change.

Mr. Roy B. Evans, Jr., joined the SMA staff in February 1960 and prior to his becoming Assistant Executive Director, served as Administrative Assistant, Assistant Business Manager, and Business Manager.

Assistant Business Manager, and Business Manager. On February 27, 1971, the Executive Committee of the Council, at its meeting in Miami Beach, Fla., named Mr. Evans as Assistant Executive Director of the Southern Medical Association.

Following the New Orleans Meeting, November 1976, Mr. Evans assumed the title of Executive Director.

Mr. Butts retired from his position as Executive Vice-President on July 1, 1980, but remained as a Consultant until December 1981.

Mr. Evans resigned in October and joined the staff of Tele-Research as their Executive Vice-President. Mr. William J. Ranieri was appointed the new Executive Vice-President and joined the staff in August

#### THE HEADQUARTERS OFFICE

As mentioned previously, the Association's offices were in the Van Antwerp Building, Mobile, Ala., from November 1910-July 1915 and in the Empire Building, Birmingham, Ala., from July 15, 1915 until 1958.

Ground-breaking ceremonies for one of the country's most modern association buildings were held on August 4, 1957. The split-level structure of masonry and glass, located at 2601 Highland Avenue, Birmingham, Ala., completed at a cost of \$250,000, was dedicated September 7, 1958.

The headquarters office contained 6,854 square feet of space and was situated on a lot of nearly one and one-half acres. It provided a meeting place and business center, executive offices, offices for the Association's publications, Auxiliary room, mailing room, conference room, and storage space.

room, conference room, and storage space.

The well-equipped office building, tastefully decorated, provided a comfortable and pleasant place for the Executive Vice-President and his staff to carry out the administrative duties and activities of the Association.

In July 1984, the headquarters office was moved to a new building at 35 Lakeshore Drive. Elaborately furnished and tastefully decorated, the office contains 22,000 square feet of space and is situated on a lot with beautiful landscaping, convenient to the interstate system.
